Late Hatched Chicks.

Although the hatching season proper should be considered at an end by May 1, it may be feasible in some sections of the northern and northwestern part of this country to continue hatching until July. Chicks hatched at that time, with proper feed and management, will frequently begin laying in January of the following year. The maturity of fowls hatched late can be greatly hastened if the mother hens are confined until the chicks are weaned. In this way feed that is furnished the chicks produces growth instead of energy to follow the mother.

Poultry Cleanliness.

The poultry house should be clean and sanitary, and the fowls free from insect pests, thereby preventing disease and mortality. It is estimated that nearly \$9,000,000 worth of poultry is lost each year through disease alone.

Increasing the Egg Supply.

The number of marketable eggs can be increased by following a few practical suggestions, says the United States department of agriculture. Among the most important of these are the production of the infertile egg after the breeding season is over and the proper handling of eggs by the farmer before sending them to market. The infertile egg is obtained when a male bird is removed from the flock. This does not decrease the number of eggs produced, but it does increase greatly their keeping qualities. The production of the infertile egg and the proper handling and marketing of eggs by the producer would increase extensively the number of marketable eggs each year by diminishing the mortality that are rendered unfit for food.

Breeds For Small Flock.

For the family which wishes to keep fowls for home consumption rather than for the market the so called general purpose breeds are better suited than the so-called egg laying breeds. The Wyandottes, Game Hens and Orpingtons are the best of these. They lay a considerable number of eggs and are also good table poultry.

The Poultry House.

The prime requisite for a small poultry house is fresh air, dryness, sunlight and space enough to keep the birds comfortable. For the general purpose breeds about four square feet of space should be allowed for each bird. Game fowls should also have about four square feet of space as possible to

The feeding period of the hog is short, and the more quickly it is grown the greater the profit.

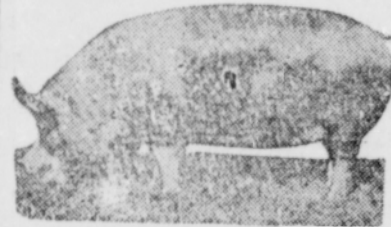
Provide a lamb creep so the lambs can be fed an extra ration of grain by themselves.

FALL LITTERS OF PIGS.

Breeding Sows For Autumn Farrowing Will Increase Pork Supply.

Breeding more sows for fall litters than usual is one way of increasing the supply of pork. Present high pork prices will have a tendency to increase breeding, but high prices alone should not be the only motive, says the Iowa Homestead. There is great need for more pork and lard as well as for meats of all kinds. Feed the sows that are now suckling spring litters liberally to keep them in good flesh. A sow must be well fed to raise two litters a season.

While it undoubtedly costs more to raise fall than spring pigs, still fall litters will pay well, particularly so if steps are taken to provide cheap feed for them. Pasture reduces the cost of pork production during the summer months. Blue grass, alfalfa, clover, timothy and clover and annual crops, such as rape, Sudan grass, sorghum, etc., are all suitable for summer use, but they cannot be used during the winter season. However, considerable use can be made of good alfalfa pasture in the fall, and wheat and rye may be grown for early winter use. If the pigs are given all the grain they

went in an inclosure by themselves as soon as they learn to eat and plenty of pasture is provided it is surprising how economically fall pigs can be produced. While it may cost slightly more to bring fall than spring pigs to maturity, it is also true that the sow which is bred for a fall litter can be maintained at less expense during the period of pregnancy than can one bred for spring farrow. Besides, owing to her opportunity for securing abundant exercise the pigs of the fall farrowing sow are likely to be stronger than those of the spring farrowing sow, which must spend most of its time in relatively close confinement during pregnancy period. When taking all these things into consideration, together with the fact that fall pigs can be sold at a time when there is a scarcity of marketable hogs, we believe that they will on the average prove just as profitable as spring pigs, particularly in sections south of the fortieth parallel, where the winters are comparatively mild.
