Home defense companies are being organized generally throughout the country. B.ownsville organized Tuesday and Halsey will organize Friday night if a meeting called by Mayor Miller is attended as it should be by the citizens of the town.

In the beginning of the Red Cross campaign Linn county was called upon to raise \$15,000, but after the campaign started and the state allotment was raised Linn county's portion was placed at \$22,000. This was met, with \$163.29 to spare. The report just completed shows that \$15,338.54 was collected in cash in the county and \$6,724 was pledged to be paid before Oct. 1, making a total of \$22,163.29.
