A Letter from W. J. Ribelin

The Enterprise received yesterday a letter from "Uncle Jesse" Ribelin, who with Mrs. Ribelin has been camping at Belknap Springs the past three weeks. They expect to remain at the springs until about September 1. An especially interesting incident of which Mr. Ribelin tells in the letter pertains to Flag Raising Day at the springs, which was last Saturday.

"An old veteran soldier and myself went out," says Mr. Ribelin, "and cut the pole, and a few of us boys took ropes and dragged it into camp, and after peeling the bark off dug a hole and raised it. At 5:30 we called the people together and sang some patriotic songs, in the midst of which two old veterans, one who had worn the blue and one who had worn the gray, pulled Old Glory to the top of the pole, after which short talks were made by 'Father' Radcliff of Salem, W. J. Ribelin of Halsey and Mayor Pryor of Harrisburg."

Mr. Ribelin says there are about 200 people at the springs and they are a jolly set. They come from almost every hamlet and town in the valley.
