OREGON NEWS NOTES OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

Fires have done much damage this season in Curry county.

Mid-Columbia fishermen are planning for a rich harvest this season.

The supreme court, now on its vacation, will reconvene September 4.

Albany may have an agricultural and stock fair and race meet October 11, 12 and 13.

Astoria will celebrate its 22nd annual regatta August 31, September 1, 2 and 3.

Telephone girls of Portland have organized a union affiliated with the American Federation of Labor.

Reports to the public service commission indicate an increasing car shortage on the Southern Pacific lines in Oregon.

Shock caused by the fire that destroyed Sumpter and took all his possessions caused the death of V. R. Meador, aged 76.

Corvallis will vote on September 4 on several bond issues and a referendum ordinance to close the moving picture theaters on Sunday.

Orlo D. Center, director of extension at the University of Idaho, has been appointed extension director of the Oregon Agricultural college.

Shipbuilders in Portland and on the Columbia river are protesting against insurance rates that they are required to pay on vessels under construction.

The elevator at Shuttler's Station, Gilliam county, is nearing completion, and is almost ready to receive grain. The elevator will hold 125,000 bushels.

Lane county farmers are enthusiastic over results obtained by using a squirrel-poison formula prescribed by the United States department of agriculture.

The Pacific highway through the northern section of Linn county, from Albany northward to the county boundary line at Jefferson, will be paved next year.

The heaviest run of salmon in several years is in progress at the mouth of the Columbia river and every cannery is working to capacity packing the fish.

Governor Withycombe has issued an appeal to the citizens of Oregon asking them to give aid to the sufferers from the fire which practically wiped out the town of Sumpter.

Governor Withycombe says that because of the dry weather that has prevailed the 200 acres of flax being harvested by the state will be practically a total failure.

The Eugene Woolen Mills company is delivering khaki cloth to the United States government at the rate of 5000 yards a month. The mill has contracted to supply 25,000 yards.

Dr. J. L. Masson of Myrtle Point, who is examining dairy cows for the state livestock board, has condemned 36 head of cows afflicted with tuberculosis in the Coquille valley.

Milo Lantz, aged 49, well-known resident of Molalla, was instantly killed while putting hay into his barn. Mr. Lantz was standing on the load, using a hay rake, which fell and struck his heart.

Because of high price of feed small flocks of poultry in the state are being reduced at an alarming rate, according to E. J. McClanahan, president of the Oregon State Poultry Breeders' association.

That students may give all possible assistance in getting in the crops, the authorities of Pacific college at Newberg, have decided to postpone the opening of the fall term which was to have been September 17.

Though it was held almost a month later than ordinarily because of the lateness of the season, the Cove cherry fair, held last week, was altogether successful. There was a large attendance from surrounding districts.

For the third time in its history the 30-year-old town of Ruthen, an O. W. R. & N. station and home of a big planing mill of the Stanley-Smith Lumber company, burned, the fire entailing a loss of more than \$25,000.

Governor Withycombe has appointed W. C. Trill, of Fossil, as district attorney for Wheeler county, to succeed J. K. Starr, who resigned to go to the Presidio, San Francisco, where he hopes to obtain a commission in the army.

Despite the drought, Lane county farms will produce an average crop this year and the farmers will receive more money when it is marketed than for many years, according to a statement issued by County Agricultural Agent Robb.

The state board of control received bids for a second time on the \$400,000 issue of Bean-Barrett road bonds, the second bids being asked for to ascertain whether a better figure could be received on shorter term bonds.

The highest bid was from E. H. Rollins & Sons, of Chicago, through the Capital National bank, of Salem, for \$332,040, or 97.01 on 100. This is approximately \$16,000 better than the highest bid the last time.

Seventy-nine Portland physicians and surgeons have already been called or have volunteered for service in various branches of the United States army and navy, representing about 18 per cent of the 375 doctors in the city.

Alarmed by a temporary shortage of distillate, Umatilla county farmers telegraphed to Governor Withycombe and to the state council of defense, asking relief from the possibility of a more serious shortage during the harvest season.

Members of the L. W. W. are charged with \$163,666 of the total fire loss of \$429,870 in Oregon during July, in a report issued by State Fire Marshal Wells, by causing fires at Klamath Falls, which was the heaviest sufferer of 47 towns in the state last month.

For the purpose, if possible, of having counties containing Oregon & California land grants act together in the collection of interest and penalties on taxes from the government, district attorneys of the interested counties held a meeting in Salem Tuesday.

To get a year ahead in the completion of contracts for highway paving under the \$5,000,000 bonding act in the goal toward which the state highway commission is now working.

By January 31, 1918, the commission hopes to have all work let for next year.

Harvey Wells, state insurance commissioner, announces that in a few days deputies from his department will make a complete survey of the Astoria waterfront and business district to ascertain if contemplated increases in rates of insurance are justified.

A. L. Lovett, entomologist at the Oregon Agricultural college experiment station, has prepared a poison which will exterminate the beetles which are now doing much damage to beans and cucumbers in western Oregon, and will soon be devastating the silks of the young corn.

Edward of 100 business men from Portland, Albany, Lebanon and Brownsville met at a banquet at Lebanon and discussed the matter of putting in a good road over the south Santiam pass from the Willamette valley to central Oregon by way of Cascade and Clear Lake.

Pronouncing the maintenance fees exacted by the J. F. Lake company, on an irrigation project embracing approximately 1529 acres of land in Douglas county as being excessive and unreasonable, the public service commission ordered reduced the annual charge from \$3.50 an acre to \$1.

The state of Oregon is going after national business and to that end will have another raid representative in Washington. The Portland chamber of commerce shortly will be represented there by a trade commissioner or secretary to be appointed by H. L. Corbett, president of the chamber.

Maintenance work on the old military highway, now officially known as the Willamette highway, which when completed will shorten the distance by road from Portland to Crater Lake 160 miles, has been completed as far as Crowbar point, one of the most dangerous points on the highway.

Standards for wheat, corn, hay and other agricultural products are fixed, rules are promulgated covering weighing, inspecting and storage of these commodities and the management of public and terminal warehouses is regulated in an order which has been issued by the Oregon public service commission.

Five fatal accidents were reported to the state accident commission during the last week, according to the weekly report. The fatalities were: Mrs. Blanche Cronder, Seapooose, railroad trespasser; George Kakeurous, Umatilla, railroad operation; Matt Kulla, Silverton, logging; C. Metcalf, Blind Slough, logging; A. G. Fisher, Black Rock, logging.

Holding that free service allowed new subscribers for a given time would be unlawful discrimination against old subscribers and bolstering its order by citing rules by similar cases in other states, notably Pennsylvania and Minnesota, the Oregon public service commission denied an application of Oswald West, receiver for the Home Telephone & Telegraph company of Portland, asking that the company be allowed to grant new patrons free telephone service for three months.
