The secretary of the interior has approved regulations for the sale at the U. S. land office, Portland, September 25, of the five sections of timber land reserved by treaty with the Siletz Indians. A description of the lands may be seen at the Enterprise office.

One thing however is pretty certain—there will always be trouble in the institution, and a failure to attain the most desirable results, until the old place is remodeled along modern lines and the hardened offenders segregated.
