Bryan's Rule of Patriotism

There is no better rule of patriotism for the guidance of all pacifists, conscientious objectors and sticklers for the rights of free speech than that laid down by William J. Bryan in a address in Chicago.

After asserting that the citizen who insists upon criticizing the war policies of the government is "a promoter of anarchy," Mr. Bryan said:

"I don't know how long the war will last, but I know that the quickest way out is straight through. Any division or discussion now would simply prolong the war and make it more costly in lives and treasure."

No man hates war more bitterly than Mr. Bryan, but the war has come in spite of everything that was done to avoid it, and Mr. Bryan's way of ending it is to beat Germany as soon as possible. That is the way of all men who see straight, and Mr. Bryan is doing a great public service in bringing the issue into the open.—New York World.

Senator Cummins Speaks

(Extract from an address by the Iowa senator made in Congress.)

If I may be allowed a personal word, permit me to say that I was not so eager to enter the war under the circumstances which then existed as were some of my associates, and as were some of the martial-minded men on the outside, but when congress declared a state of war between the United States and Germany that chapter of the controversy was forever closed, so far as I am concerned.

From that time until now, and from now until we win, there has been and will be no room in my heart for any other purpose than to employ every resource at our command to make the United States invincible in the contest of arms.

Whatever may have been true at a former time, and however difficult it is to understand what safety for democracy through

the world means, the truth now is, and no man can escape it, that the safety of democracy in America, the independence of the United States, the perpetuation of the free institutions of our own country, the honor and happiness of our own people, all depend upon our success in this war.

That citizen of the republic who refuses to give whatever he has which will aid his country in the critical hour through which it is passing, or who does anything or says anything that will increase the peril of the men and boys who are standing between us and the enemy, is unworthy of the republic which is trying to protect him.

On account of the long dry season during the summer and the rather excessive heat, Willamette valley wheat this year ranks in grade equal to that ordinarily grown in the eastern part of the state. Tests have been made showing 30 per cent gluten. Although the farmer who raised wheat in the Willamette valley may not get more money for his crop, the assurance is given by the millers that the flour made from this year's wheat will be of a much better grade than from ordinary valley wheat. Moral: Buy flour made from valley wheat.

Elk Killed Near Albany

A wandering elk, which first seen on the Whit Crawford place between Albany and Lebanon, Wednesday morning of last week, was killed that afternoon by B. B. Doughton who lives nine miles northeast of Albany on the Santiam.

Doughton was arrested by Game Warden Hawker while in the act of dressing the carcass. He testified Tuesday that he was first told of the presence of the elk when his little boy saw it broussing along the edge of a field, and ran in the barn to notify him that "there was a deer out there." He secured his gun and got a shot at close range. It took six shots to kill the animal. He did not discover it was an elk until it was killed, and it was his intention to give himself up to the authorities as soon as he had dressed the meat, he said.

He pleaded guilty in Justice Swan's court at Albany Tuesday, and was fined \$200 and costs.
