Twenty-three Oregon towns have exceeded their loan quotas.

Virtually all the staple foods consumed by the people will be put under government control November 1. The food administration announces that manufacturers and distributors of twenty fundamental foods will be required to operate under license restrictions designed to prevent unreasonable profits and to stop speculation and hoarding. It is the purpose of the administration to protect the patriot against the slacker in business.

LIBERTY LOAN QUOTA

MORE THAN HALF TAKEN

Rousing Meeting Held Last Night

Liberty Day in Halsey was characterized by a big meeting at the opera house, participated in by the Brownsville high school and a number of the citizens of that town, following a like demonstration at Brownsville in the afternoon at which several Halsey people and the local high school were present.

The meeting was addressed by Judge Thomas C. Burke of Portland, and by Messrs. Roberts of Lebanon, Hutchins, Smith and Bishop of Brownsville, and the Brownsville high school sang a number of songs. A pleasing feature of the program was a piano solo by Miss Ruth Price of Brownsville. Another popular number was a vocal solo by Al Isom of Halsey. At the close of the program the visitors were tendered a banquet at the high school.

The effect of the meeting it is believed will be a decided increase in the number of local subscribers to the Liberty Loan. A number at the meeting signified an intention of buying bonds and H. C. Davis was elected by the meeting as chairman of a committee to be chosen by himself to go out into the district to solicit subscriptions to the loan.

Figures given out this morning at the Halsey State Bank show that of Halsey's quota of \$20,000 a total of \$14,000 has been subscribed.

For some reason the bonds have been going slowly throughout this section of the state. Albany, Lebanon, Roseburg, Eugene, Salem and Corvallis were reported this morning at approximately the half-way point. Shedd has reached 91 per cent of its quota. Harrisburg stands at 36 per cent.

Reports from throughout the state indicate that beyond a reasonable doubt the full quota will be secured before the end of the week.

It is estimated at Washington that the \$3,000,000,000 mark has been passed.
