New Postal Rates

Postmaster McWilliams says it is of the utmost importance that every patron of the postal service become familiar with the increased rates of postage which go into effect tomorrow, Nov. 2. Failure to prepay the proper amount of postage will delay the dispatch and delivery of mail, cause confusion, annoyance and inconvenience, and impose upon the postal service unnecessary labor and expense.

The new rate on letters and all other first-class mail (except postal cards, post cards and drop letters) will be 3 cents for each ounce or fraction of an ounce, which should be prepaid in full. If less than the regular postage postage is paid, the letter will be returned to the sender if it is possible to do so. If the sender is not known, the letter, if prepaid 2 cents, will be rated up with the deficient postage, and despatched to its destination for collection of amount due on delivery to the addressee.

The rate on drop letters, that is, letters mailed for delivery from the office where they are posted, including those to be delivered by either city or rural carrier, will be 2 cents an ounce or fraction of an ounce. This rate also applies to all offices that have no free delivery service.

All postal cards, whether they bear written messages or are entirely in print, must be prepaid 2 cents each. That is, the 1-cent postal cards must have a 1-cent stamp affixed to them in addition to the 1-cent stamp printed upon such cards.

Post cards or private mailing cards bearing written messages, will be subject to the 2-cent rate.

Printed cards, bearing the words "post card" or "private mailing card" without any authorized written additions, will bear the rate of 1 cent, but they cannot be forwarded from the office of original address to another post office without another prepayment of postage.

No changes have been made that will affect the rates formerly paid by business men in sending out circulars to their customers.
