Starkweather

The Enterprise has had it in mind for some time to mention the candidacy of Harvey G. Starkweather of Clackamas county for governor of Oregon.

Mr. Starkweather is a democrat and he will enter the 1918 primaries with a strong following, gained by years of honest work, both public and private. It now seems not unlikely that he will be able to secure the democratic nomination, although it is of course too early to concede anything to any candidate.

Mr. Starkweather's early entry in the lists will however give him a distinct advantage, inasmuch as his record has been a sane and progressive one. He is a pretty big man in more respects than one, and Linn county democrats will do well to keep their eyes upon him.

Bound Over to Grand Jury

Another chapter was written yesterday in the celebrated case which has arisen over the attempt of Albany's speed cop to hold up an auto containing Banker Schmitt, Postmaster Stewart, Attorney Weatherford and U. S. Senator Chamberlain for exceeding the speed limit several days ago.

It will be remembered that the auto failed to stop when ordered to do so by Officer Armentrout, and that the officer thereupon made it stop by blowing a hole or two with his revolver in one of the rear tires.

In city court at Albany the speeding charge of resisting an officer, also preferred against the banker, was dropped.

But yesterday Armentrout, charged with wanton destruction of property, said property being the auto tire hereinbefore mentioned, was bound over by a Corvallis justice of the peace to the grand jury of Benton county and his bonds fixed at \$250, which he furnished.

1 1/2 cups water
1 cup seeded raisins
2 ounces citron, cut fine
1/2 cup shortening
