County Politics

Albany Democrat

With Judge P. R. Kelley mentioned strongly for a place on the supreme court and State Senator E. D. Cusick being urged to make the race for state treasurer, local interest begins to center in the primary election which will be held this spring.

While Judge McKnight has not made announcement of his candidacy for county judge it is generally believed that he will be a candidate for re-election. Attorney Guy Lewelling, Attorney L. L. Swan and J. S. VanWinkle have been mentioned as candidates for the same office, and a fight in the republican primaries is regarded as a foregone conclusion. Attorney W. R. Bilyeu has been spoken of as the democratic nominee for the same office, but it is not known whether or not he will consent to enter the race.

State Senator Sam Garland will in all probability be the democratic nominee for state senator. It is regarded as certain that F. H. Porter will be a candidate for the republican nomination for the same office. Attorney Willard Marks has been mentioned as a possible candidate, but has indicated no desire to make the race.

Whether Sheriff Bodine will be a candidate for re-election is not definitely settled. R. E. Warner of Crawfordville and C. M. Kendall are both mentioned as possible candidates and the former is almost certain to enter the primary fight.

County Recorder Velma Davis and County Clerk Rufus Russell will in all probability be nominated without opposition, and from present indications there will be no opposing candidates for the offices of county treasurer, county surveyor and county coroner.

B. F. Irvine will probably be a candidate to succeed himself as county commissioner but like many of the other office holders, has made no official announcement.
