

A Letter From Washington

The Food Administrator Writes Us:

"The use of baking powder breads made of corn and other coarse flours instead of patent wheat flour is recommended by the Conservation Division of the Food Administration. The wheat needed for export is thus conserved, and at the same time healthful food for our own people is provided. The circulation of recipes providing for these uses would be of assistance in carrying out our plans."

CORN BREAD

1 1/2 cups corn meal
1/2 cup flour
4 level teaspoons Royal Baking Powder

RYE ROLLS

2 cups rye flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 level teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1/2 cup milk
1/4 tablespoon shortening

Sift dry ingredients together, add milk and melted shortening. Knead on floured board; shape into rolls. Put into greased pans and allow to stand in warm place 20 to 25 minutes. Bake in moderate oven 25 to 30 minutes.

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Wilson's World Message

"President Wilson's statement is more than an address to congress and the people of the United States; it is a message to the world. Its lofty purpose is threefold," says the Spokane Spokesman Review.

"To France, Belgium, Great Britain, Japan and Italy it carries anew our solemn pledge to stand by them till the world be made a fit place to live in.

To Germany it carries notice of our deep determination to right the cruel wrongs that German ruthlessness and autocracy have inflicted upon suffering peoples in many lands, but with an accompanying declaration that we do not wish to injure her or to block in any way her legitimate influence or power.

And the message to the Russian people should bear good fruit, and will bear it unless the bolshevik forces in control are wholly blinded to the welfare of their sorely stricken land. The president's message to Russia could not have come at a more opportune moment, for the Petrograd organs are snarling at Lloyd George's declaration and harking back to previous utterances, which they are twisting and misconstruing into an allied purpose to leave Russia to the ravaging Prussian wolves.

If the Bolsheviki leaders should prove impervious to the friendly guarantees now promulgated by the president of the United

States nothing can be said or done to allay their suspicion and discontent.

These clear-cut, candid, honest proclamations from England and the United States will carry no comfort to the Kaiser and his junker band. They breathe a resolute spirit to fight on and on till justice and reason are again enthroned. But they should make a deep impression on the liberty-loving element of the German nation and strengthen the forces there that are longing for democracy and peace.

Will they ever reach the ears of the masses of the German people? Not if the kaiser dared to muzzle the independent press and the independent reichstag. But that high-handed action would be dangerous now. The German government has challenged the entente powers to declare their peace terms, and the kaiser has his answer now, and cannot well refuse to let the people read those terms.

These lofty utterances by England's premier and America's president should shorten the war. They cement more closely the great alliance for liberty and peace. They are an inspiration to the men in arms. And they are clarion calls to the people behind these aims and arms to rally with renewed courage and determination to the great cause that heaven will surely bless."

C. S. Jackson, state director of war savings campaign, has returned from a visit in Washington and other eastern cities full of enthusiasm for the prosecution of the war savings campaign in this state. Mr. Jackson says there is no doubt about the ultimate success of the two billion dollar war savings drive during 1918, but that it cannot be put over unless the people give to it the same patriotic support that has attended all other big drives since the war began.

Hear Canadians at Albany

The attendance was so great that overflow meetings were held at the First Presbyterian and First Baptist churches.

The talks given by the Canadian officers consisted of a plain story of their experiences at the front in the present war. Perhaps there could be no more effective way than this of bringing to our people a realizing sense of conditions in the war zone of Europe.

These meetings are being held under direction of the State Council of Defense. Senator E. D. Cusick had charge of the arrangements for the Albany meeting.

About fifty people from Halsey attended the meeting and about forty from Shedd.
