Henry Andrew Smith, the aged father of Mrs. S. H. Rike, died at the Rike home Saturday, Jan. 19. Funeral services were held Monday, Rev. T. D. Cain officiating. The six Fulk brothers, Odd Fellows, of which order he was a member, acted as pall bearers. Burial at Brownsville.

Claude Duggan, paroled convict from the federal prison at Ft. Leavenworth, who was arrested here January 8 by Deputy Sheriff Taylor on the charge of stealing an automobile, was indicted immediately upon his arrival in Salem, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to serve from one to ten years in the Oregon penitentiary.
