

Royal Baking Powder saves eggs in baking

In many recipes only half as many eggs are required, in some none at all, if an additional quantity of Royal Baking Powder is used, about a teaspoon, in place of each egg omitted.

Corn Meal Griddle Cakes

1 1/2 cups corn meal
1 1/2 cups boiling water
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup molasses
1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup salt
1/2 cup Royal Baking Powder
NO EGGS
Boil corn meal in bowl with boiling water; add milk, molasses and shortening; add flour, salt and baking powder which have been sifted together; mix well. Bake on hot greased griddle until brown.
(The Old Method called for 2 eggs)

Eggless, Milkless, Butterless Cake

1 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup seeded raisins
2 ounces citron, cut fine
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup rye flour
1/2 cup Royal Baking Powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup rye flour
1/2 cup Royal Baking Powder
Boil sugar, water, fruit, shortening, salt and spices together in saucepan 3 minutes. When cool, add flour and baking powder which have been sifted together. Mix well; bake in loaf pan in moderate oven about 45 minutes.
(The Old Method [Fruit Cake] called for 2 eggs)
