IN A NUTSHELL

For the present the most pressing food need of the allies is wheat, and a special appeal goes out from the national food administration for this easily remembered program:

Wheatless Monday, wheatless Wednesday, wheatless evening meal each day.

The meat program is also easily understood—no pork, no beef on Tuesday.

It will require but little effort and no sacrifice to comply with this schedule, but the fact should be borne in mind that it is only the minimum of what is expected from loyal citizens. If you will do more the service will be appreciated.

And the need continues for the constant saving of sugar and of butter and other fats.

COUNTY AGENT ASSURED

The Albany Herald quotes it as the opinion of Wallace L. Kadderly of O. A. C., who has been directing the campaign, that Linn county will have a county agricultural agent within thirty days. \$1200 of the \$1500 required by subscription has been secured, and the campaign is being pushed vigorously.

If by means of a county agent the crop production of the county can be materially increased in this time of war, the sooner we have one the better.

The experiment is certainly worth the making.

Slogan—make more, invest more.

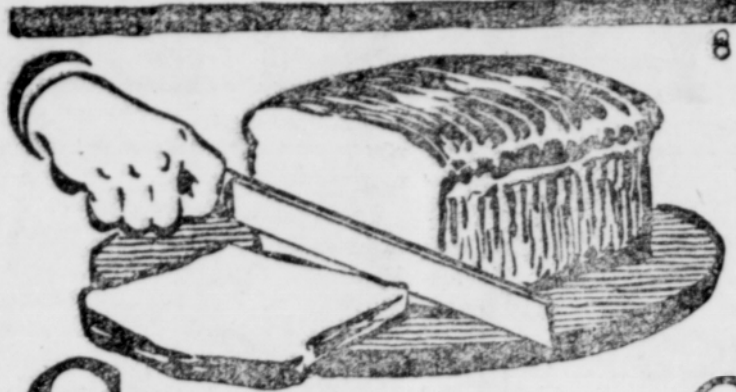
