Corn Bread with Rye Flour

1 cup corn meal	1 teaspoon salt
1 cup rye flour	1 cup milk
2 tablespoons sugar	1 egg
5 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder	2 tablespoons shortening

TRY TO WRECK SHASTA LIMITED

Nut Spiked to Rail--Train Late--No Harm Done

What is considered by Southern Pacific officials to have been a deliberate attempt to wreck that company's crack train, the Shasta Limited, was made at a point about half a mile south of Halsey Wednesday of last week.

It is believed that had the train not been behind time that day the attempt would have been successful.

A big nut such as is used in track construction was spiked to the rail in a way that evidenced much devilish ingenuity and effectually banished the theory put forward by some people outside of railroad circles that it was a "joke" perpetrated by some boy.

The discovery of the contrivance was made by Section Foreman Alford, and the matter was at once taken up for investigation. Special Agent McCarthy has been in charge of the case. To date no arrests have been made.

With the appointment of 35 county road foremen for the year, County Judge D. B. McKnight has announced that the court will not name a roadmaster to supervise the work of road construction and repair, but will personally supervise the work now started or to be done in the county. J. C. Standish is named as foreman for the Halsey district.

Linn to Furnish Eleven

Oregon must furnish 369 men for military service and entrain them for Camp Lewis, Wash., between March 29 and April 2, as its share of 90,000 men to be called up throughout the United States on those dates.

No county in the state is to be exempted from this draft call, according to orders just received from the war department by the Adjutant General of Oregon. The 369 men to be taken from the state on this call will be credited later on the quota Oregon is to furnish on the new draft, the date of which is yet to be announced.

To fill the present call, the 369 men required will be inducted out of Class I in sequence of their order numbers. Linn county will be required to furnish 11.

Although the 369 men required will be inducted out of Class I in sequence of their order numbers, this important exception will be made:

Because of the scarcity of farm labor the president has given orders that "the call to the colors of men actively, completely and assiduously engaged in the planting or cultivation of a crop, but who are in Class I and within the quota, should be deferred until the end of the new quota."

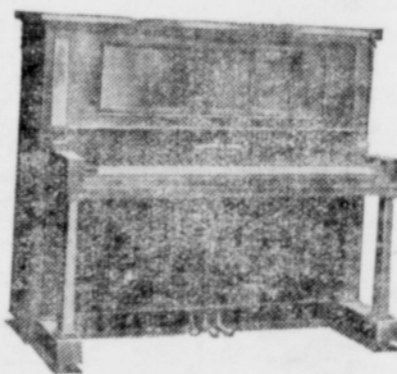
To Locate in Halsey
