This week seven teams are to be engaged in the Halsey district with teams in all the school districts to raise the funds to meet the appeal of the Armenian sufferers, to save the lives of the starving thousands, willing hands and hearts to pour in the oil of joy and relief. Our country is asked to raise quickly \$35,000,000 for this very urgent cause.

The completed canvass of the two Halsey precincts shows that our ladies' teams visited 206 families and opened up 112 new war saving accounts with \$544.06 turned to the use of the government. These accounts will grow and increase. Every where the morale of the people is shown to be excellent and a united spirit and determination to make the necessary sacrifice.

Letter from Camp Merritt

The following letter from a Halsey boy, Enoch Cunningham, now with Bat. E 65th Art. at Camp Merritt, New Jersey, will be read with interest. The letter is dated March 18:

"Dear Folks—Am just fine and feeling well. Hope you are all well. Sure had some trip. From Frisco we went on the Northern Pacific S. S. Went through the Panama canal and by the Cuban islands up the Atlantic coast. Some of the boys sure got seasick. It never bothered me any. I fell over with the heat at the canal. Sure was not. We wore just pants, shirt and shoes, and wished we had them off.

"We were on the boat seventeen days without putting a foot on land. Sure seemed good when we got off the boat at Hoboken. We got a train and came here then. Are in cantonments just like the ones at Stevens.

"We were in Frisco only two days. We were over to the fair grounds. The buildings are still there. We never got to go up to the main part of town. All we saw after we left there was water and HOT sun until we reached Panama. Then we saw negroes. We were out of sight of land for six days."
