Only with a disciplined people behind our armies can we hope to win against the Germans. A more cheerful compliance with the food regulations, and less questioning and complaining, would be better patriotism.

Loafers must either go to work or leave Eugene. This was the notice issued Saturday by the "Committee of 100." The committee also asks that the stars and stripes be displayed from each home and that the German language be not spoken on the streets of the city.

An item of general interest, and of special interest to folks who have been worrying about the world's supply of oil, appears in a recent issue of the Youth's Companion. It reports on the authority of the U. S. Geological Survey the existence of mountains of oil in western Colorado and Utah. The statement is made that in each of the states mentioned there is sufficient oil-bearing shale to yield twenty billion barrels of crude oil, from which two billion barrels of gasoline may be extracted.

We are now awaiting with the keenest of interest the official returns from Linn county in the present drive for the sale of Liberty Bonds. We are aware that some towns in the county—notably Halsey, Harrisburg and Scio—have more than met their quotas, but there are other towns which on similar occasions in the past have responded very slowly, and it is these towns upon which the eye of apprehension is cast at the present time. It is these towns whose laggardly spirit resulted in Linn county's position as first among the four tail-end counties of the state in the second Liberty Loan. The question has been repeatedly asked in this connection, "What is the matter with Linn county?" It is hoped that returns from the present bond sale will prove it to have nothing the matter with it. At any rate the returns will reveal to their discredit the particular spots in the county where patriotism is of the luke-warm variety.

At the regular meeting of the common council Monday night the resignation of Dr. Garnjobst as mayor of the city was accepted and L. E. Walton was appointed by the council to fill the unexpired term.
