A Patriotic School

The patriotic program, with a basket social at the Oak Plain rural school Friday evening was a vivid success, regardless of the April showers.

The program was strictly patriotic, consisting of songs, readings, drills and tableaux in the spirit of the times. It was well rendered by the pupils of the school, each taking an active part, showing their spirit as true patriots and young Americans.

Following, the baskets, well kept within the limit in conservation of food, and bearing the colors—red, white and blue—also the red cross, furnished by the ladies and girls, were auctioned off by G. M. Mesman, assisted by C. H. Davidson, collector, and Miss Lusky, clerk.

The proceeds amounted to the neat sum of \$37.72. Sale of baskets, \$36.55; donation, 50 cts; social 'mite boxes, \$167; membership fees, \$5.25; school 'mite' box 69 cts; total \$43.66. Therefore the sum of \$43.66 has been turned over to the secretary and treasurer of the Oak Plain Junior Red Cross auxiliary, to be used to buy supplies for the said auxiliary, which is deeply interested in doing their 'bit' to aid our country's service.

This auxiliary devotes every Friday afternoon to red cross work. Friends, parents and patrons are welcome. Give O. P. J. R. C. A your aid. Their aim is 100 per cent.

This school is doing remarkably well in the governmental line that they are capable or have the ability to do. Their record of war saving and thrift stamps is excellent, having average among the highest in rural districts.

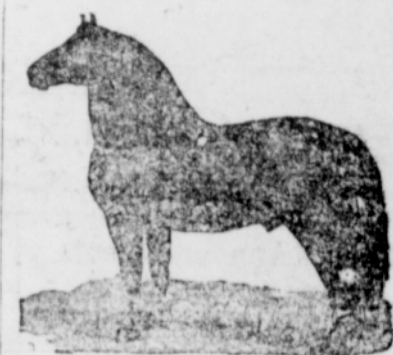
