A Little Story With a Big Thought in It.

A month ago the Red Cross chapter in Bay City, Mich., received a hurry-up call for 150 dunnage bags. Troops were about to move, and through an oversight their equipment was not complete. The bags had to be made and sent within 48 hours. A request for help was sent over the town, and the stores were searched successfully for the right materials. Among those who quickly responded and came to the chapter workrooms to help were two little girls, sisters, about ten and twelve years of age, each eager to lend a hand and do something for the boys who were going to the front. All day long the fingers of the women and the little girls were fairly flying. Bag after bag received the last stitch until scores were piled up ready for shipment. Closing time came, and the woman superintending the making of the bags counted those completed and announced that if every one of the workers could come early the next morning and work all day the bags would surely be finished in time for shipping by evening. Two crestfallen little girls, the little sisters, were waiting for her at the door as she departed.

"We are awfully sorry, ma'am," said the older of the two, "but we can't come back tomorrow. You see tomorrow we have to—" And, without finishing the sentence, she looked back wistfully at the pile of bags.

"It is too bad you can't come back," said the superintendent, "but I want to thank you, and we all thank you, for the work you've done today. You two have been a wonderful help, and that pile of bags wouldn't be nearly so big if you hadn't been here. Good night."

United States Senator

Charles L. McNary

Because United States Senator Charles L. McNary has made good he should be nominated to succeed himself in the republican primary, May 17.

From the day he became senator he has loyally championed the prosecution of the war, and during his term of office has accomplished more for Oregon than any other member in congress in a like period.

Among his colleagues he is known as "the man on the job," and during the present war crisis Oregon should consider itself fortunate in having an opportunity to return him and not be compelled to send to Washington a new, untrained man.

Believing that the supreme obligation he owes his country is to help win the war, Senator McNary, instead of returning to his state to conduct a political campaign, is at his post in Washington working for Oregon and aiding in the prosecution of the war.

Championing the cause of the Oregon farmers, Senator McNary procured for them a primary wheat market, saving thereby several million dollars to the wheat growers of the northwest.

Realizing the present food control law fails to fix prices for many commodities, Senator McNary has introduced, and is laboring for the passage of a bill, striking at profiteering and fixing prices on the necessities of life.

Senator McNary has procured Government contracts for the first time in the state's history for Oregon products, such as prunes, dehydrated potatoes and vegetables in large quantities.

Large contracts from the government for army clothing and ship building and lumbering industries.

Senator McNary was instrumental in procuring space on British ships for the shipment of condensed milk and cream from the Oregon condenseries, whereby the disaster which threatened this industry was averted.

Senator McNary is working: For prompt payment of allotments to dependent relatives of our soldiers and sailors.

A comprehensive plan for the use of the water power resources of Oregon.

For the construction of a coast military highway at government expense.

Senator McNary was born on a farm in Oregon; reared in the Baptist church; educated in the public schools; worked his way through Stanford university; is a lawyer and farmer and has been a life-long republican. He was formerly a justice of the supreme court and later chairman of the state republican central committee.

Space forbids further enumeration of the vast amount of work Senator McNary has done for Oregon, but anyone will realize from the foregoing the Senator has displayed truly remarkable ability, coupled with extraordinary diligence and energy. His native state can best show its appreciation of his faithful and efficient services by nominating and electing him.

NOTICE

We have received the following from the United States Food Administration Grain Corporation:

"The privilege issued to licensees to retain wheat and rye in interior elevators and warehouses for seed distribution terminates on May 15. We hope that every bushel of wheat in farmers' hands will be delivered to their country stations by that time. Every effort is being made to expedite the movement of wheat to the mills so that it can be ground into flour and shipped to our soldiers and Allies abroad to relieve the acute shortage which now exists.

"Will you please notify all farmers tributary to your station who may have small lots of wheat on hand urging them to bring it in immediately? Also please notify us of the name and postoffice address of any person holding wheat who is not inclined to haul it in."
