Oregon Called on for \$600,000

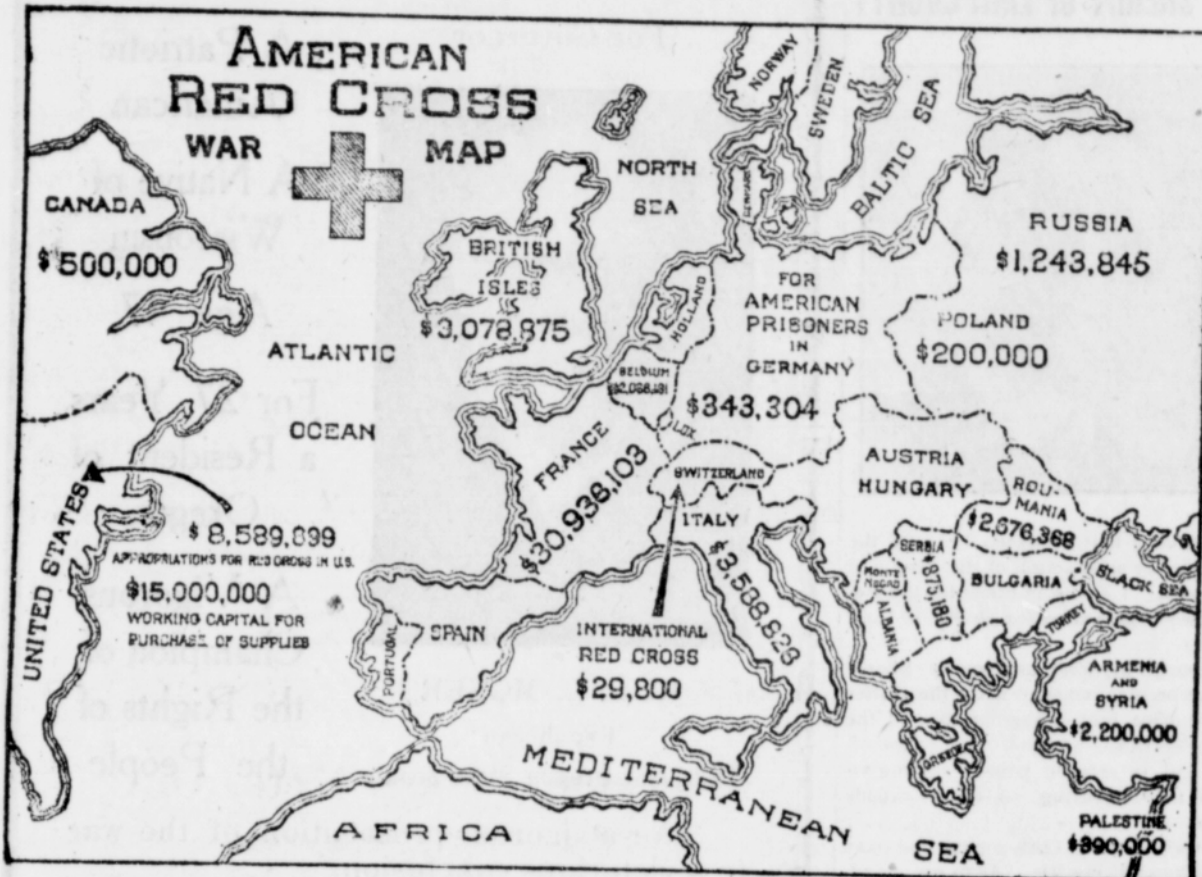
Halsey Must Do Its Share

The American Red Cross, which begins next week a great national campaign for \$100,000,000, has just issued a statement of the condition of its war fund on April 15, 1918.

Up to that date the Red Cross had expended for war purposes almost \$100,000,000 and yet had over \$10,000,000 left to spend. This was because the war fund, with interest, amounted to \$110,134,360.47. All the balance of \$10,000,000 will have been expended or allotted by June 1.

This is why this great appeal to the nation has gone out.
