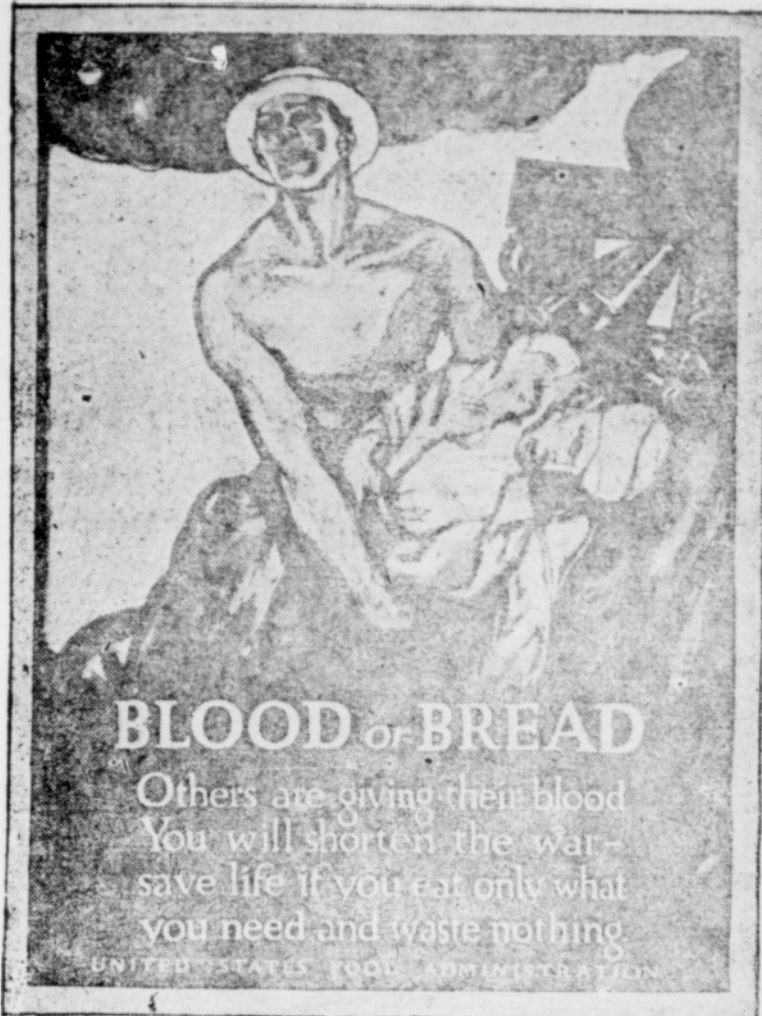




HALSEY NEWS NOTES

In the shipment of Red Cross supplies to the Albany chapter Friday, May 24, Lake Creek contributed 25 hospital shirts, 6 prs. bed socks and 2400 gun wipes. Halsey sent 71 bandages, 19 prs. bed socks, 22 prs. ward slippers, 5 sweaters, 11 prs. knitted socks, 3700 gun wipes, 25 pajama suits.

A storm of a severity somewhat unusual struck this section late Sunday afternoon, accompanied by lightning, hail, wind and rain. Some fruits and vegetables were slightly damaged by the hail, but more were benefited by the copious rain. At least one barn, that on the Yates place near Verdure, was struck by lightning and burned, as also were a number of straw stacks in different localities.

A lively party of young ladies from the state normal school at Monmouth spent the week-end in Halsey. We have received the following from the United States Food Administration Grain Corporation:

"The privilege issued to licensees to retain wheat and rye in interior elevators and warehouses for seed distribution terminates on May 15. We hope that every bushel of wheat in farmers' hands will be delivered to their country stations by that time. Every effort is being made to expedite the movement of wheat to the mills so that it can be ground into flour and shipped to our soldiers and Allies abroad to relieve the acute shortage which now exists.

"Will you please notify all farmers tributary to your station who may have small lots of wheat on hand urging them to bring it in immediately? Also please notify us of the name and postoffice address of any person holding wheat who is not inclined to haul it in."
