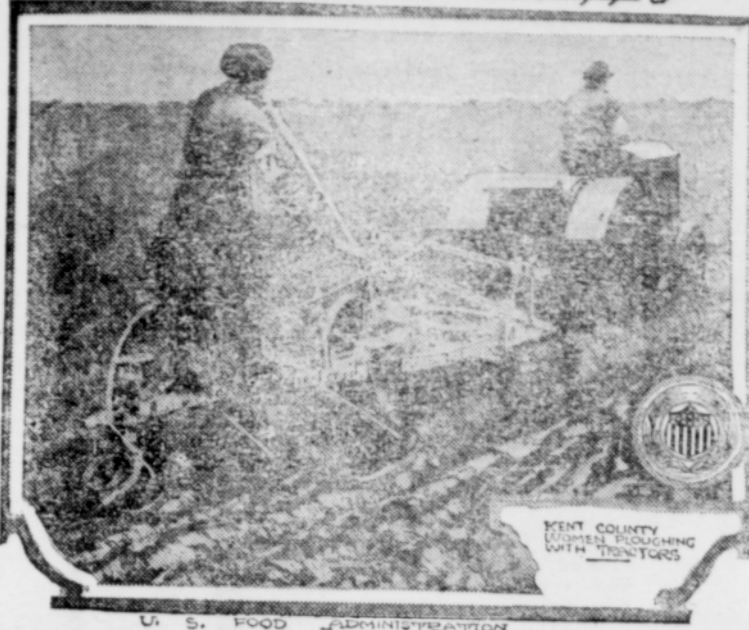

Sam Boyer, hay and grain dealer of Portland, had business in this vicinity early in the week.

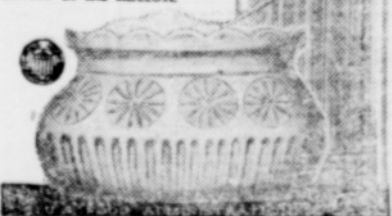
W. H. Robertson and Wayne spent Sunday afternoon in Eugene with Mrs. Robertson and Donna.
