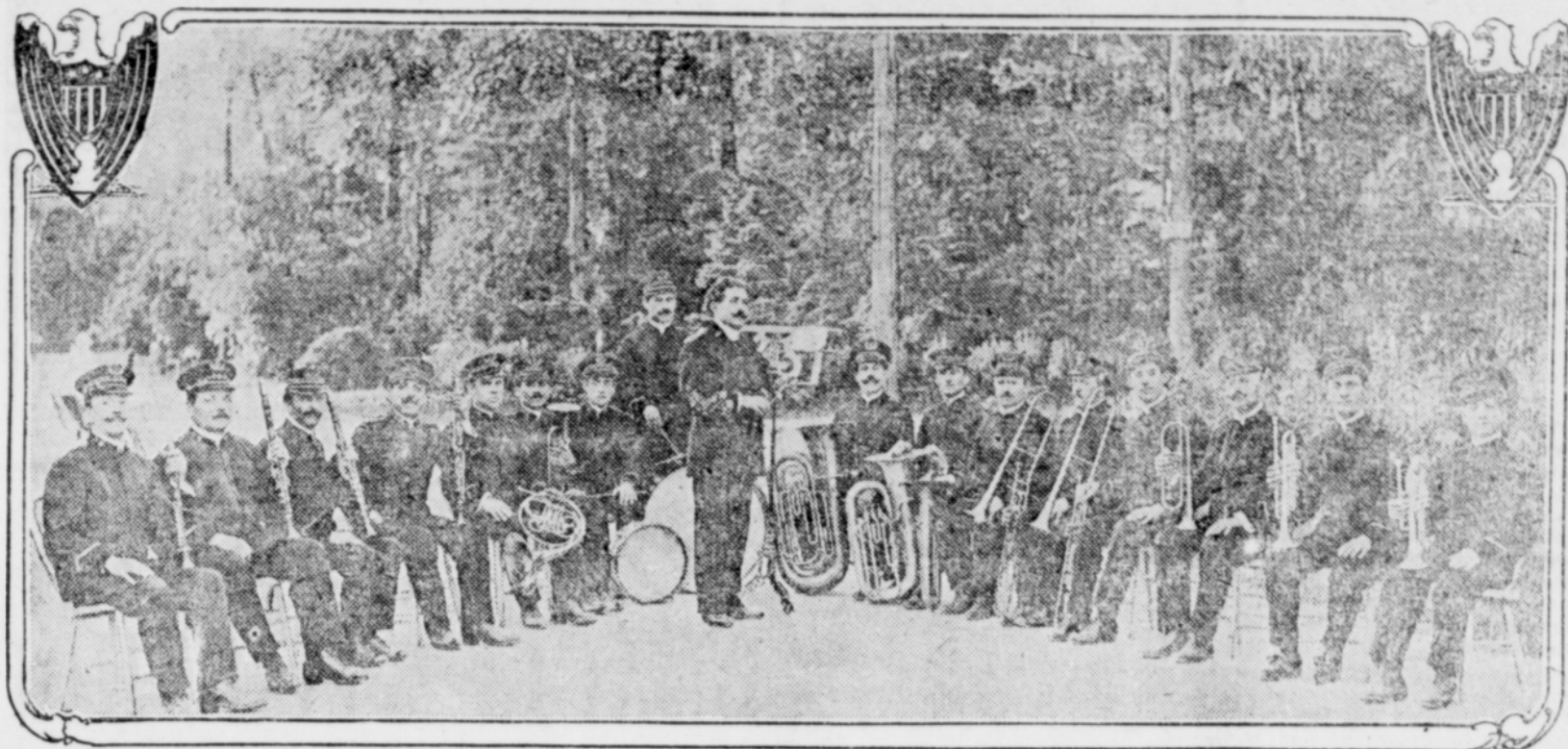


At Brownsville Friday, July 19

Chautauqua Audiences to Hear New York City Marine Band



Two years ago the New York City Marine Band made a tour of the West and were enthusiastically received by the music-loving audiences in the larger cities. Their engagement for a second Western trip for 1918 over the Chautauqua circuit is a notable one. This is the same band which for several seasons past has been in such demand for conventions and big gatherings in the East and has achieved an unusual record for repeated engagements at Pikes Park in New York.

The director, Mario Lo Zito, is one of America's foremost band leaders, the oldest brother and most widely known of the famous Italian family of that name. The soloist with the band is to be Mary Adel Hays, the New York coloratura soprano, who captivated Chautauqua audiences last year. Miss Hays has been returned as soloist on the express request of town after town. She has a glorious voice that renders the most difficult coloratura arias with ease, and a charming personality that instantly wins every audience.

Another Soldier Letter

The following letter, dated from Somewhere in France June 23, was written by Enoch Cunningham, one of the Halsey lads now on active service with the American Expeditionary Force. It was received by his mother, Mrs. G. W. Shaw, this week:

"Dear Folks,—Received your letter yesterday. Was sure glad to get it, as it was the first mail for three weeks. I got six letters altogether.

"Yes, Dwight Tindle is here with us again. He sure looks fine—fatter than I ever saw him before.

"I am still in the tent, but am just over the mumps. I never had them very bad. Only on one side. Just a vacation was all. There are four of us here now, so we have a pretty good time.

"I am glad your garden is doing well. There are plenty of early garden vegetables over here, and strawberries and cherries are ripe too. We have had strawberry shortcake for two Sundays now. Sure was good too.

"So you have received four letters from me. I have got ten from home up to now. I have received twelve from my girl. I get one in every mail that comes in.

"Well, must close. Hoping this finds you all well, I remain your loving son Enoch."
