A Letter from Geo. Schroll

Halsey Enterprise.

Dear Mr. Editor—As I have received the Enterprise regularly from the folks and read the letters from the boys who have joined the colors, I thought I would let you know what I am doing too. I am now enjoying the sunny clime of Florida. Am stationed in a small field about eight miles from Arcadia, where the alligators roam the swamps and rattlesnakes are frequently found in the patches of palmetto. There are lots of grape-fruit and orange groves near here, but the fellows began to enjoy the fruit too much, and now it is forbidden fruit. There are many other varieties of tropical fruit here also.

I am now known as a crew chief. My work is on the flying field and I have charge of two Curtis biplanes and a crew of men. It's real work too. From five in the morning until seven-thirty or eight at night. This is a school of aerial gunnery now and there will be some real excitement here when things get in full swing.

I have taken the oversea examination successfully, but my squadron is rated as the best in the field, so my chances for ever getting across are small, but I am still living in hopes.

The soil here is mostly white sand. Hot? Say, it's about 102 in the shade here every day, and no shade but palmettos about two feet high and they are infested with snakes. But it's a great life at that.

We live in nice barracks here and eat inside too, the only disagreeable things being an occasional bum cook and the sulphur water, which has a disagreeable odor and tastes something like salts.

I have traveled from Portland to Kelly Field, from there to Pittsburg, Pa., and then down here, but I still maintain that there's no place like old Oregon.

I surely do enjoy the Enterprise. My paper is Trench and Camp. Will send you one of the next issue.

DIE OF HUNGER IN ALASKA

Many Natives in Western Part of Country Perish From Lack of Food.

Seattle, Wash.—Nearly one hundred natives of the Kuskokwim mining district of Western Alaska died this spring from want of food, according to officers of a Seattle schooner which arrived here recently after carrying supplies to the North. Last winter was so severe, the officers said, that the natives were unable to hunt or fish.

The seamen said they rescued twelve miners from starvation at Good News. The twelve had lived on moss until the arrival of the schooner, which was delayed by the late breaking up of Behring ice.

MANY MILLIONS FEWER BORN

War Costs Europe 12,500,000 Potential Lives an Expert Reports.

London.—The war has caused the belligerent countries of Europe the loss of not less than 12,500,000 potential lives because of the decrease in the number of births resulting from the war, says Sir Bernard Mallet, registrar general of Great Britain. This country, he asserts, has lost in these potential lives 650,000 children. He believes that other belligerent countries have suffered in this respect more than has Great Britain. Sir Bernard estimated that every day of the war means a loss of 7,000 potential lives of children to the United Kingdom, France, Italy and the central powers.
