A Letter from Roy McNees

U. S. Marine Barracks, Mare Island, Cal., August 5.—To the Halsey Enterprise:—Having a few spare moments I'll endeavor to write you a few lines, as us marines all like to write. Besides enjoying our work I feel fine. Have gained almost thirteen pounds, so you see we get plenty to eat. We get all we want. Have ice cream at noon on Sundays, watermelon once or twice a week and plenty of muskmelon. We have all kinds of amusement. We have a reading room, a writing room, a card and game room, a big Victrola and a theatre in which movies and vaudeville are given. We sure have a good time like marines always do. We are proud of our service for Uncle Sam.

We have no flat feet in our bunch. You have to be an Al man to join the marines, and I say, boys, join the marines. In France the marines are holding the line, winning the battle for liberty. We expect to hold up our record—"first to fight."

Went on a hike last week of twenty miles and made it in record time. Three of our men fell out. I made it through fine. Was awful sore the next two days. We carried about 35 lbs. besides our guns. It was a fine trip. Five sections went, 48 men to a section.

Last Saturday was pay day for us. Most of the boys went on liberty. Most of my section went to Frisco. Left the Island Friday evening, came back Sunday evening, so you see we had a good time. Went out to Golden Gate Park and went through it. It is sure a grand place. It takes almost a day to go through it. We visited the Cliff House and took a bath in the Sultro bath house. Took a sight-seeing car and saw most of the main parts of the city. We also enjoyed the movies in the evening. The people here sure treat a man in uniform good. There are all kinds of amusements which are free to us, such as parties, boat riding, dances, etc.

We sure have our fun. We get plenty of exercise also. Have boxing, wrestling, fighting and swimming. We have to learn how to swim so when we cross the big lake and have a chance to swim we can swim.

I guess we will be here only about a week or two yet, and then will be transferred to the east to some place unknown till we get there. There we get the finishing touch put on—the real training, such as trench digging, bomb throwing, bayonet-fighting, etc. After a month or so of this we will be ready to cross the pond to do our part for Uncle Sam. We are all anxious to go. We have men from nearly every state west of the Mississippi in the marines here. Oregon sure sends some fine men here, as also does Washington.

I think I have said enough for this time, so I'll close and go to "chow," as we call our meals.
