Halsey and the Liberty Loan

Halsey is not a big town in point of population. Otherwise it is as big as any town. It is bigger than some towns that are a whole lot larger.

The manner in which it has come through on the Fourth Liberty Loan shows these facts pretty conclusively.

The town's quota was \$27090. This figure was reached last Friday night. At this writing (Wednesday) the voluntary subscriptions have mounted to \$30,000.

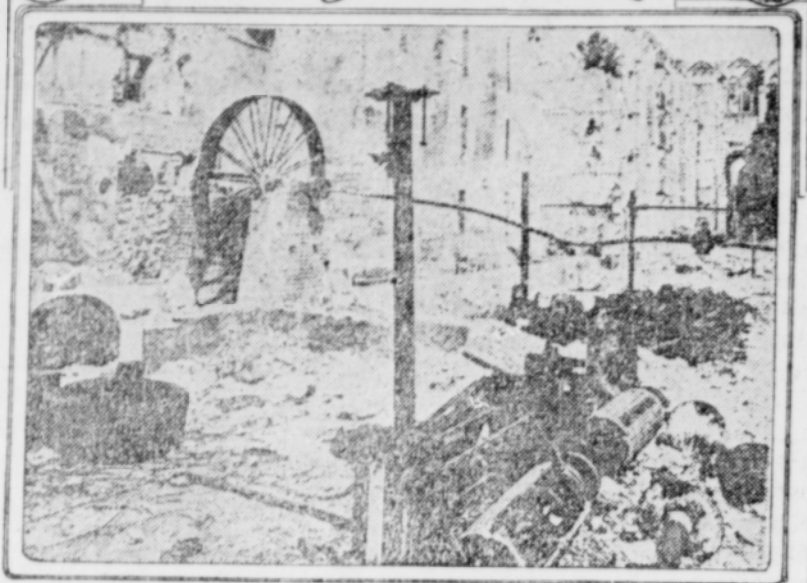

Up to last night Linn county was still \$105,000 short of its quota in the Fourth Liberty Loan. Albany lacks \$79,000, Lebanon \$50,000 and Harrisburg \$21,000. With Halsey Brownsville, Shedd and Seio are over the top. Portland with a deficit of \$2,487,400 is holding the state back.

French Sugar Mills Destroyed



France must import sugar today, most of it from this side of the ocean, because the largest portion of French sugar beet land is in German hands. As a result, the French people have been placed on a sugar ration of about 18 pounds a year for domestic use; a pound and a half a month. This photograph shows how the German troops destroyed French sugar mills. Thanks to the French rationing system the annual consumption has been cut to 600,000 tons, according to reports reaching the United States Food Administration. Before the war France had an average sugar crop of about 750,000 tons of sugar and had some left over for export.

"Cause you can't!"

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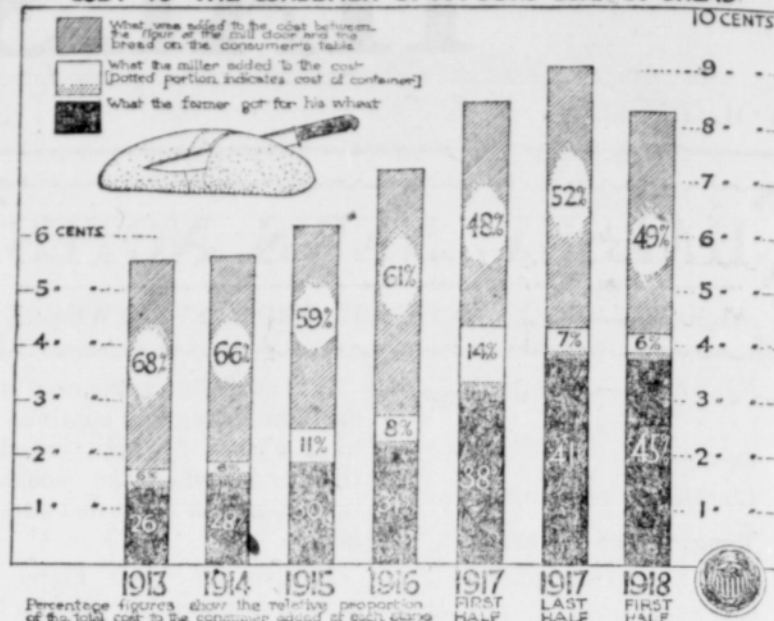
