The Epidemic

Almost within a day the Spanish influenza, which doctors are generally agreed is the old gripe which ravaged this country in 1839-50, has come to the Pacific coast.

Cases are reported from practically every town, although with the exception of Lebanon Linn county appears as yet free from the disease. It may be a different story tomorrow.

The symptoms of the disease are a sudden and acute attack, bodily weakness, pains in the

head, back, eyes and elsewhere in the body. There may be vomitings and dizziness, chilly sensations, drowsiness, inflamed eyes and throat.

Health officers are insistent that precautionary measures be taken. The disease is highly infectious. General cleanliness is urged and coughers and sneezers are to be strictly avoided.

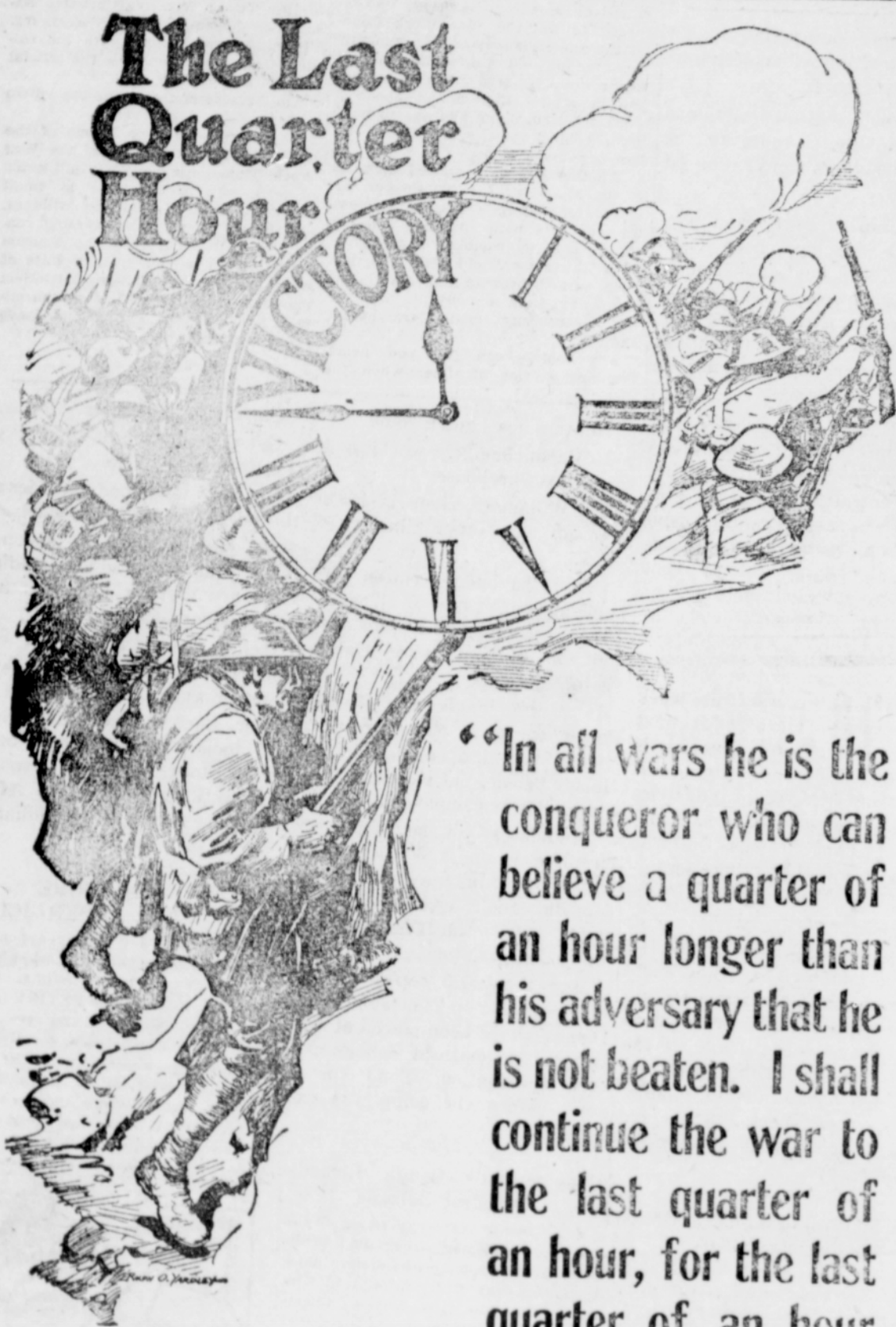
