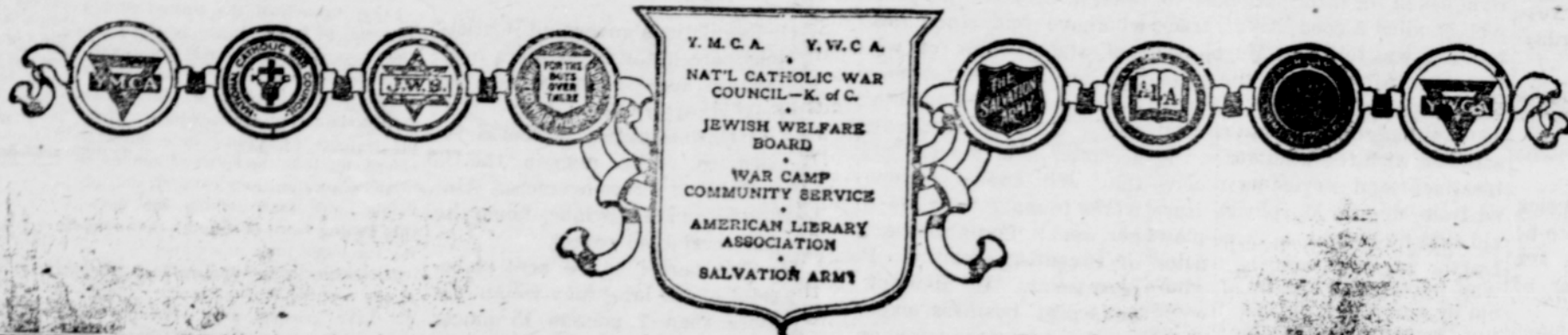

U. W. W. Campaign

The United War Work campaign is now on and is being staged for Nov. 11 to 18. In these days we must not let our patriotism and interest in doing for and backing up our boys in the camps and over seas get cold. Some may say, "O well, the war is about over; what's the use?" We don't know when it will be over, and furthermore it will take months to transport our boys back after it is over. And their social, moral and religious welfare must be looked after. Linn county's quota is \$22,500. The school district is the unit. The quota for each district is figured on the assessed valuation of property. County Chairman P. A. Young has appointed D. S. McWilliams chairman of Halsey sub-division, composed of nine districts. Mr. Young has appointed the following district chairmen: Halsey No. 41, C. H. Koontz, \$520; Peoria No. 38, F. L. Bayne, \$220; Oak Plain No. 39, H. Zimmermap, \$280; Harmony No. 40, W. P. Wahl, \$310; No. 50, W. R. Kirk, \$220; No. 51, F. H. Brown, \$170; No. 101, S. S. Leeper, \$150; No. 134, C. Sickels, \$150. Mr. Young requests that each chairman appoint a rating committee and get his organization completed. There will be a meeting of all the chairmen at the court house in Albany on Nov. 6 at 1 p. m., at which time the work will be explained and started off with a vim.

MISUNDERSTANDING CLEARED UP

A misunderstanding relative to the canteen work of the Y. M. C. A. has been cleared up by the War Department, which issued the following: "Matter of prices asked by Young Men's Christian Association for its articles sold in canteens overseas already investigated by war department and condition is being remedied. The Young Men's Christian Association was originally asked by General Pershing to run the canteens for the army on a cost basis. In order to do this it had to reckon in price fixing such overhead charges as transportation charges and marine insurance so that prices were much higher than in this country."

"The Young Men's Christian Association made no profits, but lost thousands of dollars. Arrangements now made will enable them to obtain supplies from sources that will reduce overhead charges and keep prices down."
