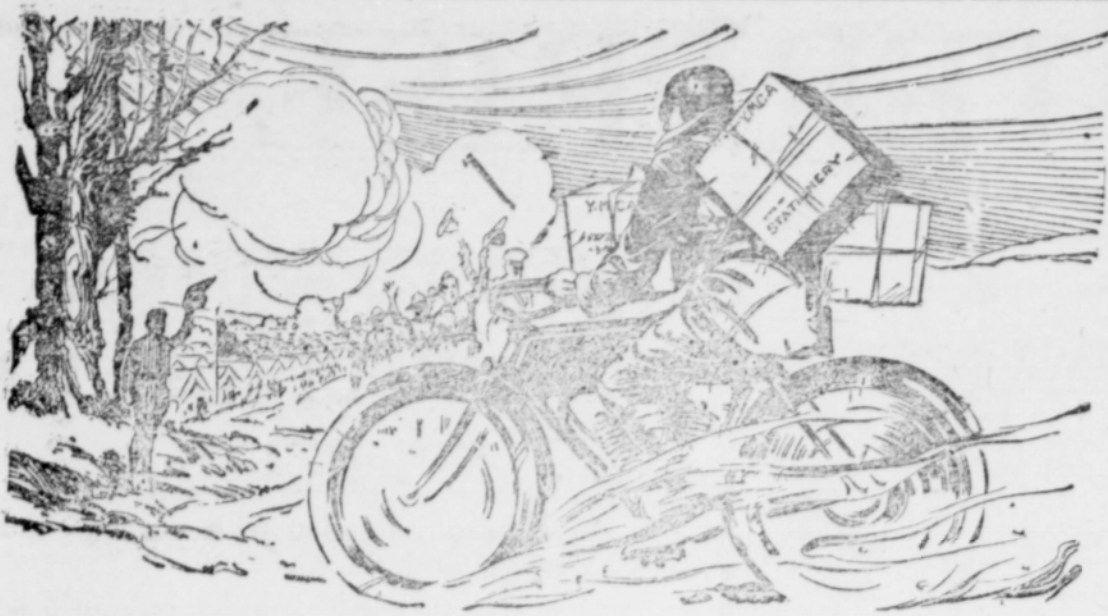




Did one of these 200 letters come to you?

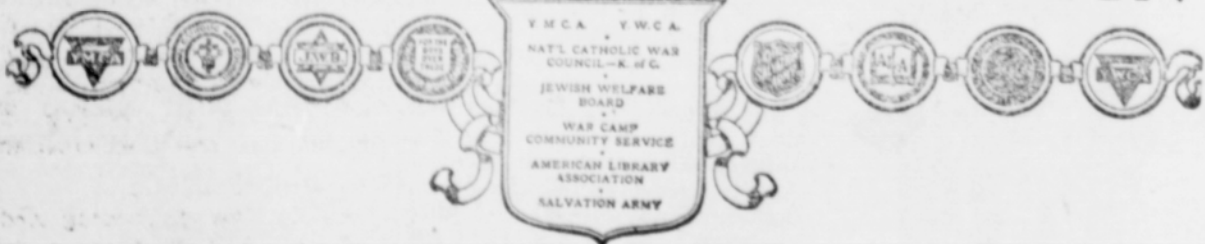

Poultry Deserves Attention at this Season
