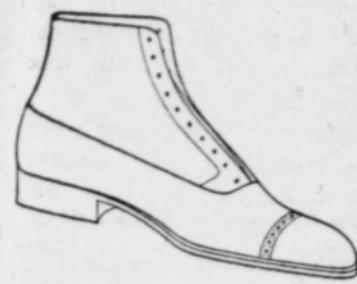

TO PREVENT "FLU"

Prof. Pernot, city bacteriologist of Portland, gives the following advice to those who would be free from Spanish influenza: "I am of the opinion that an excellent and safe preventive of the Spanish influenza would be to take nasal douches and gargles twice daily of a weak solution of calcium hypochlorite. There is a very excellent preparation of this on the market under the proprietary name of

This is a very strong solution and could be used in the proportion of 10 to 15 drops of the solution to one-half glass of water. I suggest this because the solution is about 10 times as strong as carbolic acid and is not injurious to the tissues."
