SAVE 16,000,000 BUSHELS OF WHEAT THAT FORMERLY WAS LOST IN THRESHING

Farmers, Urged by Food Administration, Provide Seven Extra Loaves of Bread for Every American.

By adopting cleaner threshing methods and by literally combing harvest fields to gather grain formerly wasted, threshermen and farmers of the United States this year saved fully 16,000,000 bushels of wheat, estimated as equivalent to about seven one-pound loaves of bread for every person in the country. This result, accompanied by corresponding savings of barley, oats, rye and other grains, is shown by reports from 33 grain states to the U. S. Food Administration. Other states, although not prepared to furnish definite figures of conservation in the grain fields, report greatly reduced harvest losses.

This rural food saving achievement, accomplished in scarcely six months' time, was in direct response to requests by the Food Administration, which asked farmers and threshermen to reduce harvest losses from about 8 1/2 per cent.—the estimated average in normal times—to the lowest possible minimum. Country grain threshing committees carried into every grain growing community the official recommendations for accomplishing the results desired.

In numerous instances drivers of racks with leaky bottoms were sent from the fields to repair their equipment and frequently bad order threshing machines were stopped until the cause of waste was removed. But in proportion to the number of persons engaged in gathering the nation's grain crop, cases of compulsion were comparatively rare. The Food Administration freely attributes the success of the grain threshing campaign to patriotic service by farmers, threshermen and their crews. Incidentally grain growers of the United States are many millions of dollars "in pocket" as a result of the grain saved.

Dear Ones at Home,
Well I haven't got to write to you for a long, long time have I? Believe me it was impossible to do so. We are on the march now, just stopped for the evening, and are putting our little pup tents up to rest our weary bones in.

I have no envelope as yet but will write now, so that when I get one I'll mail this. I suppose you got my card that told of my initiation in battle. If I were only home I could talk to you hours about it. A fellow lives several years in a few hours. I came thru in fine shape, the closest they got me was a shrapnel hole thru my sleeve. I got one German that I am sure of and helped capture a bunch of prisoners. We sure made it hot for them when they put up any resistance, but they spent most of their time running.

The Germans don't "save" fighting the Americans but run like sheep. If it were not for the officers holding a pistol over their heads, I don't believe the blankety blanks would fight at all.

It would surprise you to see all the different soldiers here that are after the Kaiser's goat. French, English, Japs, Italians, Negroes, both French and American, and the Sammies. I guess you can see by the papers the result of this mixture.

I don't know whether you can read this. I am using my gas mask for a writing desk and it makes a pretty bum one. I got six of your letters, was spending my time in holes and dugouts and believe me they were certainly appreciated. The letters are just about worn out from reading them. That picture of you folks on the porch at Springdale sure did look natural.

Do not worry if you don't receive letters from me for long intervals, because it is impossible to write for 15 or 20 days at a time. Another thing mother you need not worry about me keeping clean morally and otherwise, because I have so far and shall continue to do so. Don't trouble about that ever. However I will mention one thing. When we were at the front I didn't get any water to drink for 3 days, we were cut off by artillery, so the 2nd day my buddy, as we call our sleeping partners, prevailed on me to chew some tobacco. For a wonder it did not make me sick but relieved the thirst. I suppose you can forgive me that time under the circumstances, can't you?

I was glad to hear that you took the Halsey work again,

"Daddy," I think you should say there for a long time.

Well I'm going to get supper now, our kitchens have pulled up with some hot chuck. Will write some more later.

Oct. 30th.—Well I've carried this letter several miles since I last wrote. There is no new news to write, since I got hold of an envelope. I will mail this tomorrow. I am feeling fine, am tough as a pine knot now. Don't believe anything could phase me. My throat has never troubled me in the least since I came over here.

Well will close, lots of love to all.

WHAT HOME SERVICE MEANS.

So many questions are constantly coming to the Home Service Section of the Red Cross that a few words as to its objects may not come amiss. The Home Service Section aims to serve the folks at home, to bring them nearer to the man in the field, and to bring him nearer to the ones at home. Sometimes it means helping to straighten out a financial tangle, sometimes help in the training of the children, sometimes being a big brother to a young lad who needs a bit of friendly counsel, or advising a young wife who may be worried about the coming due of the mortgage and what her rights under the law may be.

Then, too, there are sometimes delays in the mails or lost letters, or errors in the amount which should be forthcoming. These problems and many others are being straightened out by the Home Service Section, without charge to the families, and with an efficiency which is daily growing more valuable. More than 300,000 calls have been answered.

For those who are worried because of the non-arrival of letters a cable is sent inquiring about the man's welfare.

In fact the Home Service Section is living up to its name—it is really the service of those at home—it is trying to be the father, brother or husband to those left behind.

FRENCH AUTHORITIES ACCLAIM WORK OF AMERICAN RED CROSS.

Dr. Chassaigne of the French Military Sanitary Service and M. Goyon in recent addresses paid warm tribute to the work of the American Red Cross in the war, and M. Auriand, prefect of the Department of the Seine, praised the personal efforts of Red Cross workers.

Prof. Pernot, city bacteriologist of Portland, gives the following advice to those who would be free from Spanish influenza: "I am of the opinion that an excellent and safe preventive of the Spanish influenza would be to take nasal douches and gargles twice daily of a weak solution of calcium hypochlorite.
