Warning

Complaints have come to the city authorities that certain people have been carrying concealed weapons and have been discharging firearms promiscuously within the city limits. The following are Sections 5 and 6 of Ordinance No. 62, applying to this matter:

Sec. 5—Discharging Firearms and Airguns—That any person or persons who shall fire off or discharge any ordnance gun, pistol, rifle or other firearm within the corporate limits of the City of Halsey, or any squib, rocket, Roman candle, chaser, fire cracker, bomb, torpedo, or other fire or detonating works of any kind or nature whatever, or who shall discharge any blasting powder, gun powder, dynamite or other explosive substance in said city, or who shall discharge any airgun in said city, shall upon conviction thereof in the Recorder's court be punished by a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00, or in default of the payment of such fine by imprisonment in the city jail not less than two days nor more than twenty-five days, provided that the Marshal or Mayor may permit upon National holidays and other days of public celebration the discharge of cannon, anvils, fire crackers or fireworks; and provided further, that the Marshal may in writing permit the firing of guns or the discharge of blasting powder, gun powder, dynamite or other explosive substance for purposes deemed necessary or expedient.

Sec. 6—Carrying Concealed Weapons—That any person or persons who shall carry any firearm or deadly or dangerous weapon of any kind in a concealed manner within the corporate limits of the City of Halsey, shall upon conviction thereof in the Recorder's court, be punished by a fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00, or in default of the payment of such fine, by imprisonment in the city jail not less than five days nor more than fifty days, provided that peace officers shall be exempt from the provisions of this section.

These laws will be vigorously enforced.
