Mrs. J. C. Booth and daughter, of Lebanon, visited at Halsey last week as a preliminary to an outing on the coast.

Mrs. E. J. Pearl has returned from Corvallis, where she underwent an operation in a hospital, and is recovering nicely.

Anthony Austin, a well known farmer and thresherman and for three years chief of police of Albany, died Sunday morning of cancer.

On Monday the glass for Ed. Starr's new confectionery store arrived. This city seems to be livelier than it has been for a long time. One hears the sound of the hammer and saw on all sides. Piles of lumber are scattered here and there and we look for a new and better Brownsville.

Carl Swank, who lives on his ranch near Crawfordville, has been a victim of a series of misfortunes. He lost two houses in the fire which swept our city, and on Sunday last one of his horses,

fighting another horse, kicked a barbed wire fence, cutting itself badly and in some way cut one of its feet off entirely. Mr. Swank had lived with his mother, taking care of her during the illness preceding her recent death. Her funeral took place on Monday afternoon.

Wednesday night some one pried open a window of the Morse garage, near the Times office, took out a Chevrolet car and ran it nineteen miles at such a rate of speed that it was ruined, then returned it to the garage. The mechanism of the car was ruined by the heat generated. The floor board was burned through and it is a wonder that the garage and all that part of the town were not destroyed. Mr. Morse, who lives near by, heard the car go out, but tho't Carl Ward was taking it out for legitimate purposes. Suspicion points in a certain direction. J. P. McKinney, aged 87 years died August 1st. He was a pioneer settler and home builder here. He is survived by the following sons and daughters: George, Will, Ed, Mark, and Lester McKinney, Mrs. Kittie Petticord, Mrs. Ida Dinwiddie, and Mrs. Luella Shaw. His death occurred at the home of his son George. Funeral services were at the Methodist church Sunday with burial at the Masonic cemetery, and the attendance was the largest at a funeral in this town in many years.

The residents of the Calypsoa valley were sadly surprised Tuesday when the news was wired that Samuel McQueen had been killed Monday afternoon while at his work in a logging camp near Gates. The accident occurred just at the closing time. Mr. McQueen was the 'chaser' on the main line and was standing in the bight of a line which

tightened striking him across the right shoulder, neck, and back of the head, and killing him instantly. He was born near Holley 24 years ago and with the exception of seven months in the service of his country has lived at his home practically all the time. The funeral was held at the Crawfordville cemetery Wednesday, Rev. Elmore officiating, and the Odd Fellows using their impressive interment service.

An unsigned and undated letter, post marked at Sawtelle, Calif., and addressed to the Times, says: This is to inform you that Matthew Farley, a well known old resident of Crawfordville, who has lived around there for the past 40 years, and a veteran of the civil war, died at the national soldiers' home at Leavenworth, Kansas, on July 11, 1919. Matthew and his wife, Ida Farley left Crawfordville early last February for the soldiers' home, Cal. where he was to un-

dergo an operation for a growth on his jaw, but the surgeons were afraid to operate as the condition was serious, and treated the growth externally but to no avail. His suffering grew so intense that he went to the Leavenworth home to go under treatment of a specialist, but when he arrived there his condition was such that it was found impossible to operate with any hope of success in his weakened condition. His son, Milton, who had recently been discharged from the army at San Diego, made a flying trip from the camp to reach his father, and arrived a short time before his father passed away.
