Some Timely Recipes.

TOMATOES EASILY CANNED.

Only red, ripe, round tomatoes should be picked from the vine for canning, rather than partly green ones that may be left standing several days to "ripen," say the O A C cooking specialists. The tomato does not develop its characteristic flavor after being picked. Scald, cold dip, peel and pack into sterilized jars either whole or in large pieces. Fill to within one fourth inch of top with thick tomato sauce. This helps to keep the tomatoes whole, plump, and of good color. The sauce may be used later for soups and the tomatoes for salads. To each half pint jar add one half teaspoon salt and one teaspoon or more of sugar. Sterilize for 22 minutes in hot water bath.

TOMATO-APPLE MARMALADE.

Six pounds tomatoes, six pounds of apples and nine of sugar are used with a 50c jar of preserved ginger to make tomato-apple marmalade. Cook the tomatoes soft and put thru strainer. Cook the apples as for sauce. Boil apples, tomatoes, and sugar to consistency of jam, adding ginger just before taking from the fire. This will make 12 pints of delicious marmalade.

PRESERVE EXTRA TOMATOES.

Boil 6 pounds of sugar, 2 quarts water, one-half lemon, one-half ounce cinnamon and one-fourth ounce ginger for 15 minutes, then add 4 pounds of tomatoes gradually and cook till bright and clear. Stir occasionally to prevent burning. Cook rapidly to keep the color right. Allow to cool before packing.—O A C Cookery.

Is It Not Up To Harrisburg To Pledge Highway From Alford?

(An editorial from the Harrisburg Bulletin.)

"The highway and bridge question has not changed any for the better or worse during the past week. There is a sign, however, on the part of the land owners across the river. They are beginning to see the hope of years slip from them and Leon Boggs and J M Hochdanner appealed to F L Beard, president of our Club, to do something, and he at once addressed a strong letter to the county court.

Our sister town of Halsey is also in fear that the highway may not pass thru that town and they have organized to bring pressure upon the county court and offered a plan which would bring the highway as far as Alford.

This paper has already mentioned a possibility that the county court would choose a cutoff from Alford along the west side of the railroad to Harrisburg. If this plan should be adopted, together with the Halsey plan, then the highway would parallel the S P the entire distance from Halsey to Harrisburg.

It is a very feasible plan and one that this town could well afford to further with zeal. In fact it is almost inevitable upon Harrisburg to procure this end of the right of way and donate it to the county court.

With this route into the city there can be no question that the bridge would be located here if it were possible

for the engineers to determine to a certainty that the river channel will remain where it now is.

Shedd Items Gathered From Here And There.

Shedd farmers have ordered a ditcher, with which they will open up the present main channel thru the calapooia swale, which starts half way between Brownsville and Shedd and runs past Shedd. They will pay for it co-operatively. Work will start this fall as soon as the ditcher arrives; the farmers are determined to drain this area and will not wait to form a drainage district.

County Agricultural Agent S V Smith appeared to be a busy man last Friday. He held committee meetings with farmers at the home of S G Simons near Shedd at 9 o'clock and at R E Spaulding's near Oakville at 2 o'clock, and at W H McConnel's near Shedd in the evening at 7 30.

The ladies of Shedd have conducted a school exhibit for their locality for several years. This year the work was under the supervision of Mrs E W Shedd who formerly taught in the Shedd schools.
