Live Stock Industry Organized on Firm Basis by Breeders.

Seventy-five breeders of pure-bred livestock enthusiastically and unanimously organized the Linn County Livestock Association, the first of its kind in Oregon, at a meeting at the St Francis hotel in Albany Tuesday.

Breeders of Poland China hogs fraternized with Shorthorn cow men and poultrymen; Clydesdale breeders rubbed elbows with Rambouillet sheep enthusiasts and all were firm in the conviction that the association should break down all individual strain barriers and that it would do more than any other single thing to put Linn county on the map.

County Agent S V Smith, who is recognized as the father of the movement that is so heartily concurred in by every stock man in the county, and who drew up the constitution which was unanimously adopted, stated the objects of the association as follows:

To improve the quality of livestock in general on Linn county farms, by assisting farmers to get good breeding stock, by interesting boys and girls in livestock clubs and assisting them in securing a good start in pure-bred stock, by an effort to standardize breeds in each locality, and by encouraging the keeping of production records.

To make the breeding of pure-bred stock more profitable to the breeder, by assisting him to advertise and dispose of his salable stock thru a breeders' directory and auction sales, and by enabling them to buy breeding stock as economically as possible thru co-operative purchasing and dispersal sales, and by disseminating information on the subject of livestock breeding and holding breeders schools.

Senator F H Porter was elected president of the association; Ed Schoel, vice president; S V Smith, secretary; and A C Schmitt, treasurer. The board of directors shall contain one representative from each breed of stock represented in the association by at least three stockmen, and breeds with less representatives can combine to gain representation. Each breed will choose its own director.

Every man at the meeting was asked to get up and tell who he was and what he bred. J B Cornett, of Shedd, told of the vast opportunities in the livestock industry, and how he had been forced to sell good yearling steers and heifers for \$50 each when he started out in Linn Co. and he hoped for prices which enable him to feed properly. "I can see further ahead, now, and realize that I am further from the goal than I did when I started," he concluded.

J C Brown, of Shedd, Jersey breeder, and one of the best-read men in the business, said: "The dairy cow is the wet nurse of the human race and I believe that any enterprise which develops the growth and nutrition of the rising generation is laudable and we should put our shoulder to the wheel."

Ben Sudtall put in a word for a sale pavilion, which members of the association could utilize.
