**Senator Porter Called for a Conference with the Governor.**

Senator Porter went to Salem Monday where he had been called by the governor for a conference on the game commission controversy.

Mr Porter states that all the game committees of the state were called to hold a council prior to the meeting of the special session of the legislature which convenes next Monday. Some definite policy will probably be settled on at this meeting.
