Shedd Gets the Extension School Commencing Feb 2.

An extension school will be opened at Shedd Feb 2nd and will run for three days. Prof W S Carpenter of the crops department, Prof E B Fitts of the dairy department, and Miss Lassie Lane, domestic science expert, are the O A C people who will conduct the school.

Dairying is one of Shedd's principal industries and the farmers of this section are anxious to progress along their chosen vocation by listening to the most modern doctrines concerning the care of milk cows and the marketing of their products.

A petition was lately gotten up by the citizens themselves whereby County Agent Smith was asked to arrange for the extension school for them. They wanted primarily a dairy school, but decided it would be best to vary the three days' courses with crop lectures and Prof Carpenter will talk mostly upon the growing of crops beneficial to dairy herds.

Domestic science lectures will be delivered to the women of the community each day of the short course. The school is to be conducted under the auspices of the farm bureau and O A C. It is the first of its kind to be held in Linn county for several years.

The Shedd Jersey Calf Club has stimulated more than passing interest in dairying and affairs of the cow. The Shedd Boys' Calf Club has the reputation of being the best on the Pacific coast and is the only one on the coast to receive one of the \$75 prizes from the American Jersey club. There are twenty active members in the club.

Tax Budget Gets By County Court

The Linn County Court filed its official report of the tax budget Wednesday based on the tax roll of 1919.

The exact rate of tax has not as yet been made out by the assessor. The amount approved for the various funds are: General county fund, \$61,890; County school fund, \$75,000; County High school fund, \$22,000; County Road, Bridges, and Ferries, \$50,033; Road district fund, \$75,000; State tax, \$134,335.80; for interest on the bonded indebtedness of the county, \$7,500; Bond redemption fund, \$20,000; Market roads, \$37,000; making a grand total of \$481,758.80.

Harrisburg's school levy is the highest of any town in the county being 16.1. Brownsville has 13.8 mills. Albany 13.2, Halsey, 7.7 Lebanon 10.1, Scio 13.1.

Levies for the various incorporated towns are as follows: Albany 14.7, Lebanon 20.1, Harrisburg 11.8, Sweet Home 11, Brownsville 8.7, Halsey 8.3 and Scio 11.9.
