Lake Creek Holds a Farm Bureau Meeting.

According to schedule arranged by County Agent S V Smith, the Lake Creek Farm Bureau held its annual meeting Sat, Jan 1st. In order to make the undertaking more enjoyable the ladies of the community planned a basket dinner for which they are justly famous. It is said of most responsible authority that this event surpassed those of any previous effort, but yet reported had the misfortune to get his liver stuck in the mud and so missed the cats entirely, a circumstance which disturbed him much.

After dinner the meeting was called to order by Chairman Thos Jackson. The time generally was spent in discussing various farm problems and in formulating a program for the next year's work, with County Agent Smith leading the discussions. Among the prominent undertakings for the next twelve months are crop and livestock improvements, and poultry culling, with Henry Brock, Thos Ardrey and Mrs Williams as committeemen respectively.

The meeting voted unanimously to secure if possible during the month a two days' extension school from the extension division of the O A C, with a course in Home Economics for the women and one in crops and feeding for the men's division. Committeemen for this project were Mrs Cummings and C R Evans. C R Evans was chosen by the various committeemen as chairman of committees.

J S Cook, mgr of the Linn County Co-operative Shipping Association spoke pointedly of the practice of farmers laboring months to produce various commodities and in paying no attention to the market end of their industry.

The entire neighborhood is to be congratulated on the energy with which they have undertaken these farm problems.
