Our Sermonette.

Sulfur May Aid Plant Growth

That sulfur acts directly in promoting plant growth and also favors assimilation of more nitrogen by stimulating legume bacteria development and activity, is indicated in greenhouse trial by the O A C experiment station chemists. Of two field trial one plot responded to sulfur and the other did not, showing the need of trials before making large applications. Experiments are still under way to determine what effect sulfur has on assimilation of nitrogen by clover with and without aid of legume bacteria.

Cruelty of Early Shearing.

The first week in March sheep and goat shearing is commenced in some parts of the west and often great suffering and losses are the results.

The ewes having lambs need the shelter of their fleeces during the cold and often rough weather with rains and snows in March and April.

There is not much danger of wool and mohair going down in price after cases of flocks take chances of losses by early shearing.

The State humane societies in western states would do well to look after cases of too early shearing and prosecute too greedy owners.

Many sheep have come thru the winter in poor condition and to lose their fleeces before rough weather is over is cruelty.

Fair Board Votes \$35,000 To Complete Grounds.

At a meeting of the Linn county fair board at the St Francis hotel one day last week it was voted to raise \$35,000 immediately to pay for the site of the fair grounds and also for the construction of the various proposed buildings. Of this amount \$9000 has already been pledged or subscribed.

A committee to sell stock in the fair association for the purpose of raising the needed funds was appointed. The general plans for the buildings as submitted to the board by Architect Eabb were approved by the board. They consist of a main pavilion 50 by 196 feet, machinery sheds and stock buildings. A grand stand to accommodate at least three thousand persons was also included in the plans.

Another feature of the grounds will be an automobile pavilion. This was turned over to W R Scott to arrange. It was voted to have racing at the fairs and Wayne Stuart was selected as chairman of the committee upon races and tracks.

Taxes Delinquent April 5.

Warning that personal and property taxes will become delinquent and be subject to penalty, has been given out by County Assessor J S Van Winkle, who has turned his rolls over to the sheriff for collection.

The sheriff's office has been busy since the first of the month sending out statements and collecting taxes. While many are coming in there is still a great amount to be collected.

Under the law, Assessor Van Winkle points out, one half of a person's taxes must be paid by April 5th to escape a payment of one per cent per month interest on that half. If this half is paid by April 5th the remaining half

may run until October 5th without interest. If none of it is paid by October 5th a 5 per cent penalty, in addition to the 12 per cent or one per cent per month, will be imposed upon the property. After six months if taxes are not paid in full certificates are drawn against the property and sold by the sheriff and county court. This places an incumbrance upon the property similar to a mortgage.

Good progress is being made by the field men who are out now, in this year's assessment work, according to the assessor.
