Mrs Price Passes Away.

On Sunday last the funeral services of Mrs Rose Ann Stafford-Price were held in the Christian church under the direction of C H Phillips, the pastor. The service was brief and simple, the pastor bringing a message of comfort in his sermon on the Christian view of death, recalling the active and useful life of the deceased, and the joy of the assurance that the gospel holds out to such as she of rest, which is spoken of as sleep by the Savior and the apostles.

The church, filled to its capacity, was fittingly draped and the many floral memoriams bespoke the sincere regard in which she was held. Among those from others than her relatives that were especially beautiful was one from the Rebekahs and one from the C W B M of the church.

Following the service, the body was taken to the Stafford cemetery on the Mohawk for interment beside that of her former husband.

Mrs Price was a pioneer of the Willamette valley, having come with her father, Calvin Pell, from Ohio, in 1852. She was born Feb 23, 1842, and was married to A M Stafford in 1856. In 1900 Mr Stafford died as the result of an accident when loading hay.

In 1917 Mrs Stafford was married to A R Price of Pullman, Wash. She was a second time bereaved as the result of an automobile accident, which caused the death of Mr Price, her daughter, and son-in-law, and serious accident to her self from which she was slowly recovering.

Death came as a result of her recent attack of influenza, while she was visiting at the home of her grandson, Marion Hansell, in Athena, Oregon.

She is survived by a brother, John Pell of Lites, Idaho, two daughters, Mrs C D Linn of Long Beach, Cali, and Mrs J H Henderson of South Bend, Wash; two sons, Guy C Stafford of Ralston, Wash, and C P Stafford of Halsey. All of these, with the exception of Mrs Linn, were present at the funeral, together with many other relatives and friends from a distance.

Mrs Price lived a long and useful life, and was a member of the Christian church since she was a small girl, being at all times active in its work.

She was also a member of the Rebekah lodge.

Her cheerful and indomitable faith under the most trying circumstances is the secret of her life, and though she is no longer in the flesh, she will live in the memory of her friends because of her works. Truly she exemplified the words of Whittier, a most fitting conclusion to this account.

"The dear Lord's best interpreters

Are humble human souls; The gospel of a life like hers Is more than books and scrolls."
