The Stevenson Chain Letter.

In talking with Mr Stevenson one day this week, he informed us that he had in his family a "chain" letter by which all the members of the family get to hear from all the rest of them at the same time. Every member of the family puts in a letter as it comes to them and when it has made the rounds of the whole family it is retained in the letter until it reaches the secretary when he takes them all out and puts them on file, and starts a fresh one.

The scheme is something similar to what the editor calls his "omnibus letter." There is, however, a difference in the removing of the letters.

In the omnibus letter, No 1 writes a letter and sends it to No 2. No 2 writes a letter and encloses letter No 1 and sends both letters to No 3. No 3 does the same thing, enclosing all the letters and sends them to No 4. No 4, being the last one, writes his letter and encloses the other three letters and sends all four letters to No 1. No 1 takes out his first letter and puts in a new one, which still leaves four in the bunch, and forwards to No 2. No 2 takes out his first letter and puts in a new one and sends to No 3. There are always the four letters in the bunch and all fresh to all the rest.

In the editor's chain or omnibus letter (called the "Wren omnibus" because it takes up the mother's side of the house instead of the father's, and her maiden name was Wren,) there were twelve families represented, and maybe you think there wasn't a rejoicing when the Wren omnibus came around to each family. It was started about nineteen years ago and has averaged a trip around the circle once a year.

The original passengers in that "omnibus" are all dead now except the editor and one other, but in most cases their children have taken it up and it still makes its rounds.

We understand there are seven families represented in the Stevenson chain letter.

It is a regular family reunion when that chain letter reaches anyone of the members of the family.
