### Pay Your Government Taxes.

June is a busy month for the Internal Revenue Bureau, as during that month all special taxes for the fiscal year ending on June 30, 1921, are due and payable.

Collector of Internal Revenue, Milton A. Miller, has mailed out to all special taxpayers forms upon which return for payment of tax must be made. These special taxpayers include proprietors of theatres, for hire automobiles, pleasure boats, pool and billiard tables, bowling alleys, shooting galleries, retail dealers in oleomargarine, brokers, pawn brokers, etc.

Other classes of taxpayers affected are druggists, physicians, dentists, and other practitioners, who must complete their registration under the Harrison act not later than July 1st, after which date they will be delinquent.

On or before June 15th the second installment of income tax will be due and payable, and notices for this tax were sent out some weeks ago. Persons who fail to pay the quarterly installment due on June 15th will be required, within ten days after notice and demand, to pay the entire outstanding balance on their income tax, as failure to pay one installment when due makes due and payable all the remaining installments which would ordinarily be due on September 15th and December 15th.

Collector Miller would greatly appreciate the co-operation of taxpayers in making their returns and payments as early in June as possible.

## Another Royal Suggestion MUFFINS and POPOVERS

From the NEW ROYAL COOK BOOK

**B**REAKFAST is too often eaten as a duty rather than a joy. The success of the day may depend upon the spirit of breakfast. The Royal Educational Department presents some breakfast dishes that will send the children to school with a hip hip hurrah and his majesty man to his daily duties with the "up and doing" feeling which knows no discouragement.

### Muffins

**3 cups flour**  
**3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder**  
**1 tablespoon sugar**  
**1/2 teaspoon salt**  
**1 cup milk**  
**2 eggs**  
**1 tablespoon shortening**  
Sift together flour, baking powder, sugar and salt; add milk, well-beaten eggs and melted shortening; mix well. Grease muffin tins and put two tablespoons of batter into each. Bake in hot oven 20 to 25 minutes.

### Eggless Muffins

**3 cups flour**  
**4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder**  
**2 tablespoons sugar**  
**1 teaspoon salt**  
**1 cup milk**  
**2 tablespoons shortening**  
Mix and sift dry ingredients, add milk and melted shorten-

ing and beat until smooth. Bake in greased muffin tins in hot oven 20 to 25 minutes.

### Corn Muffins

**3/4 cup corn meal**  
**1 1/4 cups flour**  
**4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder**  
**1/2 teaspoon salt**  
**2 tablespoons sugar**  
**1 cup milk**  
**2 tablespoons shortening**  
**1 egg**

Sift together corn meal, flour, baking powder, salt and sugar; add milk, melted shortening and well-beaten egg; mix well. Grease muffin tins and drop two tablespoons of mixture into each. Bake about 25 minutes in hot oven.

### Popovers

**2 cups flour**  
**1/2 teaspoon salt**  
**2 eggs**  
**2 cups milk**  
Sift together flour and salt. Make a well in flour, break eggs into well, add milk and stir until smooth. Pour into hot greased gem pans and bake 25 to 35 minutes in a very hot oven. If taken out of oven too soon they will fall.
