#### Our Sermonette

If children, then heirs of God, and joint heirs with Christ, if so be that we suffer with him, that we may be glorified together. Rom 8: 17.

Reading the Father's plans for ourselves, in the light of his will exemplified in his dealings with our Master, we may settle it at once that it is not his will to keep us from all pain and trial and sufferings, and to carry us triumphantly to glory on flowery beds of ease. Quite the reverse, indeed, must be our course if we would follow in the footsteps of him whom God set forth to be, not only a satisfaction for the sins of the whole world, but also a pattern to the Church, which is his body. And this much learned of God's plan and will promptly teaches us that we must not expect and should not ask freedom from pain and trouble, which his wisdom has ordained to be the path to glory.

#### Federal Tax Revision

While the press and the people are struggling over the details of the great national political campaign, business men are working on a plan of federal taxation that shall displace the present inequitable system.

A committee of seventeen gentlemen

who are heads of large mercantile and manufacturing organizations, and representatives of the nation's best interests, has charge of the proposed changes. Surely these American leaders can have no interest in business conditions that are going to work a great hardship on anyone, and congress and the people who are really the power back of congress can well listen.

These men believe that the excess profits tax and the high surtax are business killers, driving investors away from productive industry and into making all their investments in tax exempt securities.

They propose a re-arrangement of the present high and direct burden on business, some plan to set business free, to increase production and to reduce prices, that are now artificially raised by shunting taxes.

Taxing undistributed surplus encourages extravagant dividends, stops the expansion of industrial plants and increased production, and will eventually lead our country into an era of national insolvency.

Under consequent business depression the present excess profits tax, high surtaxes and luxury taxes will not produce revenues, and the government cannot rely upon them as a permanent peace time policy.

The next session of congress will be compelled to take up the problem of a revision of federal taxation from the standpoint of placing a premium upon industrial production rather than penalizing initiative.

#### Trees and Electricity.

In the movements being started to beautify highways by planting trees along the roadside, care should be taken to see that the trees are so planted as to not come in contact with the telephone and power lines.

Interference with these wires by tree branches causes poor service or a complete stoppage of service. In wet weather tree contact with the wires is extremely dangerous as the wet branches are fine conductors of electric currents and have led to many accidents when persons or animals come in contact with such a tree.

Where highways are to be beautified with trees, a variety should be chosen which will not grow to such a height as to interfere with the wires and the trees should be planted as far as possible from the wires.

It is necessary that public utility companies be allowed to string their wires along the highways, for the cost of private rights of way would be so high, that the resulting cost of service to consumers would be prohibitive.

A little co-operation now in regard to this matter will obviate much trouble later.

#### Fourth of July Celebration Boom Seems to Result in a Fizzle

We reported last week that arrangements had been made for a Fourth of July celebration, and committees had been appointed to push the various parts of the work forward.

# PIES and PASTRIES

From the NEW ROYAL COOK BOOK

**CHEER UP!** There is no further reason for worrying about table variety. The new Royal Cook Book gives new suggestions for every meal every day. The book is so full of surprises there will never be another dull meal in the home. Here are a few suggestions from the new Royal Cook Book.

#### Plain Pastry

This recipe is for one large pie with top and bottom crust

2 cups flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder

1/2 cup shortening  
cold water  
Sift together flour, salt and baking powder; add shortening and rub in very lightly with tips of fingers (the less it is handled the better the paste will be). Add cold water very slowly, enough to hold dough together (do not work or knead dough). Divide in halves; roll out one part thin on floured board and use for bottom crust. After pie is filled roll out other part for top.

#### Rich Pastry

2 cups pastry flour  
1/2 teaspoon Royal Baking Powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup shortening  
cold water

Sift flour, baking powder and salt; add one-half shortening

and rub in lightly with fingers; add water slowly until of right consistency to roll out. Divide in halves; roll out one half thin; put on in small pieces half remaining shortening; fold upper and lower edges in to center; fold sides in to center, fold sides to center again; roll out thin and put on pie plate. Repeat with other half for top crust.

#### Apple Pie

1 1/2 cups flour  
1 1/2 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 tablespoons shortening  
4 apples, or 1 quart sliced apples  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1 teaspoon milk

Sift flour, baking powder and salt; add shortening and rub in very lightly; add just enough cold water to hold dough together. Roll half out on floured board, line bottom of pie plate; fill in apples, which have been washed, pared and cut into thin slices; sprinkle with sugar; flavor with cinnamon or nutmeg; wet edges of crust with cold water; roll out remainder of pastry; cover pie, pressing edges tightly together and bake in moderate oven 30 minutes.
