Accident at Alford Station.

Tuesday morning when the north bound train that is due here at 11:55 was at Alford station, an automobile containing a man, two women and a child attempted to cross the track just ahead of the train, but the train struck them. One woman was killed outright, the man died before the train reached Halsey: the other woman was badly wounded on the head and probably internally and was not expected to live, and the child was badly injured, having at least a broken leg. Dr Garnjobst and Mrs John Bramwell got on the train and accomprnied the woman to Albany where she and the child were placed in the hospital.

The name on the man's accident insurance card was Joseph P Schrimsher, 1017 Ellis St, San Francisco. It is supposed that they were a man and his wife and child and mother of either the man or the woman. The elderly lady was the one that was killed outright. Her body was left with an attendant where the accident occurred, to await the coroner's coming. Later information. The woman died near Shedd, and the bodies of the man and woman were taken to the undertaking parlors of Coroner C E Fisher. The little boy was taken to the hospital but died a short time afterwards.
