"Stock Judging Contest." The First National Bank of Albany, and the First Savings Bank of Albany, are offering a silver trophy cup to be given to the school which furnishes the winning team in a stock judging contest which is to take place on Friday, Oct 8th, at the Linn county fair at Albany.

Each school is entitled to appoint a team of three, the members may be either boys or girls, between the ages of twelve and eighteen. Each team contesting for the prize should present to the judge a statement signed by the teacher or the clerk of the School Board, certifying that this team was duly appointed to represent the school. No school shall have more than one team. The county Agent, S V Smith of Albany, is in charge of the contest, and for rules and regulations write to him.

Friday Oct 8, is free admission day for children. It is optional with districts but where the majority wish to attend the fair it might be well to declare a holiday for the school. The fair is strictly educational.
