## This Gets the Weeds.

Disking the winter grain field as soon as dry enough will kill the young weeds newly up and start the germination of the weed seed a little lower down.

The new weed crop can then be killed by harrowing, leaving the seed bed in fine condition for a crop free of weeds.

## Turu to the Other Man's Left.

Many accidents would be avoided if all who use the roads observed not only the state law but the natural laws of courtesy as well. A man coming up behind a vehicle and wishing to pass should pass on the left side. The man in front naturally expects that and if he turns out to give the passing vehicle more room he will turn to the right.

If a man undertakes to pass a man on the right side and any casualties occur, he will be criminally responsible for them. He would be responsible if he ran into the forward vehicle while passing on the left side also if the man in front turned out to the right to let him pass, but if the man in front would turn to the left, he himself would be to blame for accidents accruing.

Pass each other on the left no matter whether from the front or the rear, but in order to pass on the left when meeting a vehicle it is, of course, necessary to turn to the right.

On the Brownsville road one day last week an accident was narrowly avoided. A man coming up from the rear turned to the right; the man in front naturally turned to the right to let the man pass, with the result that there came very near being a rear end collision.

## Russians Deeply Religious.

The Russian people, from the most remote time, have been deeply religious by nature. In every public establishment, in every office, railroad station, post office, bank, tavern, store, and almost in every dwelling, there is an ikon (holy picture), placed in a corner, with an oil light before it, steadily burning. These ikons look like bas-relief; only the head and hands of the image are painted on the background; the rest of the picture is composed of engraved, gilded metal, very often of real gold and silver incrustated with diamonds and other precious stones, according to Constantin Fraboul, writing on religious customs in Russia in Current History.

## India's Cave-Temples.

Cave-temple of Ellora are a series of remarkable rock-cut temples, 13 miles northwest of Aurangabad, India, and excavated about 300 A. D., although Hindoo legends give the date of the excavation as 7,000 years ago. There are 34 temples of large dimensions, some of which are cave-temple proper, cut out in the interior of the solid rock, and have an exterior as well as an interior architecture. The most famous of the latter is called the Kailas, its interior being 103 feet long, 56 feet wide and 17 feet high, and stands in the center of a vast area.

## Relics of Lost Race.

Many interesting relics have been found recently of the lost race or prehistoric people who lived in the great community dwellings now in ruins near Aztec, N. M. The evidences of a surprisingly high civilization include curious sandals woven from yucca leaves, fiber and cotton. The people delighted in ornaments of shells cut into disks and beads of turquoises and shell. There are Jasper arrow points, bone awls and needles. The basket weaving was also of a high artistic quality. The most interesting of these relics is the coiled pottery made by rolling long strips of clay and winding them round and round as is done in coiled basketry. The ancient people who made these articles are believed to have been the original cliff dwellers.—Boys' Life.

## Birds Not Frightened by Noise.

One thinks of birds as shy and delicate creatures easily frightened by a sudden sound. That's error. A bird is disturbed by noise only so long as the noise is associated with danger. The moment noise ceases to threaten them birds seem to mind it not at all. The gentle, hisping phoebe chooses to nest under bridges across which wagons and trucks pass frequently with a deafening roar. If the bridge is under railroad tracks, where the racket is yet greater, it's all one to phoebe. The gravel roof of some high office building in the noisy center of the city is often the chosen nesting place of Mrs. Night Hawk. The creature most harassed by nerves and noise is the one that makes the most noise of all. That's man!—Cleveland Press.

## Speed of Falling Bodies.

Galileo first put the relative rates of speed of falling bodies to the test by dropping various weights from the top of the leaning tower of Pisa in Italy. He found that when let fall simultaneously they reached the ground almost at the same time, whatever their size or weight; any differences shown being due to the resistance of the air. If a coin and a feather are dropped together in a closed tube from which the air has been exhausted, both reach the bottom at the same instant. In other words the force of gravity is constant at any place for all bodies and gives an acceleration or rate of speed to falling bodies of over 32 feet per second.

## The Takahe.

One of the most remarkable birds in New Zealand is the takahe or Nitoris Mantelli (or N. Hochstetteri) a sort of coot which has developed the colors (including the metallic luster on green and golden brown feathers) of the peacock. Only four specimens of this bird have been obtained. One of these is in the Otago museum, Dunedin, New Zealand. Others are to be seen in the South Kensington Natural History museum, London, but these have been obtained at a different season of the year, for where the Dunedin specimen is bright blue their plumage is more of a pruned color. The fourth specimen is, or was, in the Dresden museum.

## Deep Breathing for Nerves.

"The dentist was filling a tooth in a most ungetatable position for me," said a woman, "and had equipped my unfortunate mouth with gag, saliva conductor and the rest of the armory of torture when an attack of nerves seized me and I motioned wildly to be set up. 'Breathe slowly and deeply,' said the man of pain, 'and all will be well. There is nothing like breathing for the nerves.' For once I did as I was bid and in a few seconds all was well, and I sat the rest of the ordeal in an exemplary fashion. It is wonderful how one can control all hysterical inclination by simple, steady breathing."

## Broad Street Once a Canal.

Broad street was once a canal. New York city was taken by the English in 1664, and their first map, called "The Duke's Plan," after James, duke of York, the brother of King Charles II, to whom his royal brother most kindly presented the city, and who changed the name from New Amsterdam to New York in his honor, shows little change from that of 1642, according to the Merchants' association. In the year 1672 the English filled in the old canal and made the present Broad street by dragging down the red sand from the higher ground along Broadway and Wall street.

## Thimbles.

We are told that the art of making thimbles was brought to England by John Lofting, a mechanic from Holland, who set up a workshop at Islington, near London, and practiced the manufacture in various metals and forms with profit and success in 1695. But according to some authorities the thimble is mentioned earlier than 1650. All thimbles except the tailor's, which is open at the top, are or should be bell shaped. The most serviceable thimble is made of steel, but others are made of gold, silver, horn, ivory and bone.
