

Man With Grit Wins.

Grit has a way of taking possession of you. Under its influence you act as though you were a different person. And that may be more true than we think. Certainly there is a new spirit in the man who dares what has been hitherto impossible. It's the grit that lies back of him that does the work. Sometimes it comes late in life. But more often it shows itself with the first great testing. Enemies may think they have things their own way. The outcome will depend on who has the grit. When you see the lips straightening into a fixed line and the eyes taking on a new luster you want to be on your guard. The man with grit isn't advertising himself. He just waits until action is needed and then you involuntarily make way for him.

Arts of Spinning and Weaving.

The development of the arts of spinning and weaving took place so early in the history of civilization that no records of their beginnings are preserved. At the time of Alexander's expedition to India the natives of that region wore shawls of great beauty. The Greeks learned many processes of woolen manufacture from the Egyptians, and the Romans after picking up the art from the Greeks passed it on to the occidental world. Woolen garments were worn by the Romans at a very early period. It is probable that the first lessons the ancient Britons received in the art were derived immediately after the Roman conquest.

Socrates and Plato.

Fenelon relates that when the father of Plato wished to have his son educated he took him to Socrates, who, by some strange coincidence, had dreamed the night before that he bore in his bosom a young swan which as soon as the feathers came upon it displayed its wings and singing with inexpressible sweetness raised itself into the highest regions of air, soaring with intrepid flight. Socrates never doubted that the swan typified Plato and the boundless fame he was destined to enjoy. Plato and Socrates believed in dreams and Aristotle admitted that they might have a supernatural origin.

"Trimmer."

As a name for a certain kind of politician the word trimmer came into use shortly after the restoration of the Stuarts. It was used as a name of reproach for a person who tried to take two sides at the same time; "one who runs with the hare and hunts with the hounds." A more worthy meaning was that the person to whom it was applied was a moderate. It is said that in the reign of Charles II, a very able public man of the time, Charles Montague, earl of Halifax, adopted the term trimmer to signify that he was neither an extreme whig nor an extreme tory.
