Custard Pie

1 cup pastry flour
1/2 teaspoon Royal Baking Powder

1/2 cup shortening
cold water

Soft flour, baking powder and salt; add one-half shortening and rub in lightly with fingers; add water slowly until of right consistency to make dough. Roll out very thin; put in small pieces remaining shortening; fold upper and lower edges to center; fold sides in to center again; fold sides in to center again; roll out thin and put on pie plate.

Custard

1 egg
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup scalded milk
1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Beat eggs, add sugar, salt, flavoring and milk very slowly. Line pie plate with paste made as above, and bake in very hot oven about 30 minutes. Pour custard into the baked crust and bake in moderate oven about 25 minutes. The pie is done when a knife put in center of custard comes out dry.

Coconut Pie is made the same way, adding 1 cup of shredded coconut, and using only 1 egg.
