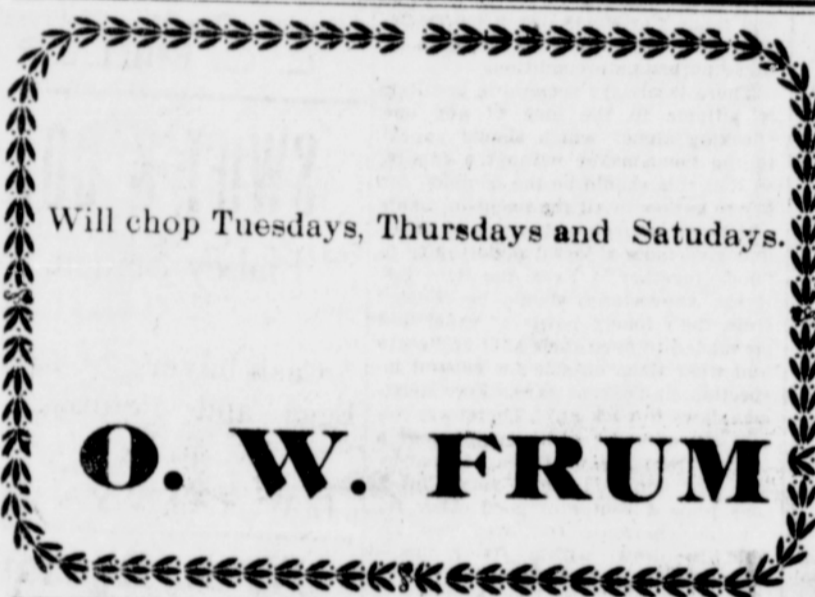

Our Sermonette

A word in season, how good is:
a word fitly spoken is like ap-
ples of gold in pictures of silver.
Prov 15: 23, 25: 11.

We are to remember, when talk-
ing with those who have an ear to
hear and are inquiring the way of
the Lord, that there are great
crises in the lives of men, mo-
mentous occasions, in which one
word may be more valuable, more
potent, than would be a hundred
words or a thousand words at
another time under different cir-
cumstances; and we are to be in-
stant in the Lord's service, wheth-
er reasonable or unreasonable to
ourselves,— gladly ready to lay
down our lives for the brethren.
We are to distinguish, however,
between out-of-season to ourselves,
if it be in season and opportune
for them. We are not to intrude
even the gospel itself at inopport-
une times, however convenient
the occasion may be to ourselves.

A Letter From Honolulu.

Mrs Pray received a letter from
her daughter in Honolulu, Mrs
Morrow, from which we take the
following excerpts:

Dec 2. Dear Mother: I guess
I am a good sailor for I have not
been a bit sick nor have I missed a
single meal.

We left San Francisco yester-
day noon, and at 3 o'clock we hit
a storm all right, and the boat
sure did roll, but tonight it is
not so bad, and by tomorrow they
tell me we will be in the warm
zone. I am enjoying every min-
ute of the trip and I guess if I could
keep well in the storm we had, I
will be able to stand it the rest of
the time.

They had a movie on the ship
tonight in the social hall and it
was pretty good.

Dec 3. All day there has been
a hard wind and the spray came
over the ship so that it was cold
and damp outside, and tonight
just at supper time the boat began
rolling so that it threw every thing
off the table or nearly so, and
some of the people off their seats.
I was at a little table that was
intended for two of us so that I
could hang on, but the old boat
sure did roll and toss first on one
side and then on the other. I am
a bit seasick, so I am happy—
or am I afraid? Some are scared
but I guess there is nothing to
fear.

Dec 4. Well we sure did roll
all night but it is better today.
We passed the sister ship to this
ship today so we had something to
look at. We arrived at 7 a m
Tuesday.

Dec 6. We had some wonderful
weather here, so warm and nice
I got up this morning to see the
sun rise. It is the most wonder-
ful sight I have ever seen.
