Something About The Pacific Highway.

Copy of County contract. "Albany, Oregon, Jan 13, 1921. "To Albany Chamber of Commerce and Whom it may concern:

"The Engineers and County Court of Linn County, Oregon, estimate the Pacific Highway can be graded from Driver's crossing to Harrisburg for the sum of \$73,000.00.

"There remains in the County Treasury unsold \$75,000.00 of the bonds authorized by the people, which is applicable to the Pacific Highway.

"If these \$75,000.00 bonds are sold this Spring, the whole of said money, or such as is necessary, will during 1921 be applied to grading the said road and to no other purpose.

"The Highway Commission agrees to rock all of said highway as soon as the proper grade is made.

"The Highway Commission has agreed with our roadmaster, that if the Pacific Highway is graded from Driver's crossing to Harrisburg during 1921, that the sector from Albany to Driver's crossing will be paved during 1921. The Highway Commission says the money is available to pave said road when it is ready for paving, and we assume if it is gotten ready in 1921 that it may be paved in 1922.

It appears that the state has issued bonds for highway paving, and Linn county not having very many roads that are ready for paving it follows that she will not get her just proportion of benefit from such bonds, and the market is such that moneyed men are not apt to buy them for speculative purposes, it also follows that if bonds are sold for this purpose they will have to be sold to local buyers along the proposed highway who have the home road interests at heart more than the few per cent difference that they can

get for their money invested in other than road bonds.

Realizing this condition of affairs, the Albany Chamber of Commerce has appointed J M Hawkins, D O Woodworth, L L Swan, Claude H Murphy, and Lloyd Templeton as a committee to work with the County Court towards the selling of sufficient bonds to grade the Pacific Highway to Harrisburg during 1921.

This committee has been acquainted with the fact that there are \$75,000 of unissued bonds that are applicable to this road. The Highway Engineer, the Road Master, and the County Court have estimated that the road from Driver's crossing to Harrisburg can be graded for \$73,000.

Now if that grading is done it seems to be up to Linn county to buy the bonds. The Bank at this place has been appointed to take subscriptions for these bonds and it is hoped that enough public spirited men who have the capital to spare will buy the bonds and push this work to completion.
